And here let me say that the office of supervisor is not one which contemplates its exercise by deputy. The law knows no such office as that of Deputy Supervisor. The duties of Supervisor are personal, and the number of supervisors fixed by law; one for each road district, and the districts not to exceed twelve for the whole county. There can be no more serious neglect of duty than to delegate to deputies, whom the law does not recognize, the discharge of functions involving personal skill and trust.
