THE GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE. Governor Jackson on Wednesday sent his message to the legislature. The first part is in regard to Maryland's financial condition for the fiscal year, 1891.

The total amount available in the treasury for the fiscal year, 1891, was \$1,414,443.33. The disbursements for the year were \$1,501,804.81, leaving a balance in the treasury of \$826,638.52.

The Governor alludes to the Archer defalcation to show that he has been unduly criticised in that connection and that he had simply trodden the path of his predecessors, trusting meanwhile implicitly in a man whom he believed incapable of wrong.

The improvement in tobacco inspection is noted and amendment of the oyster law is suggested. As to the latter, the Governor thinks it would be well to prohibit dredging before November 1.

The Baltimore Sun says that great things are expected of Senator John G. Rogers, of Howard county. We can assure the Sun that any expectations of right-thinking people along this line will not be disappointed.

not be continued, that "unnecessary taxation is unjust taxation" in State as well as in Federal finances. He thinks the treasury relief loan bonds, amounting to a half million dollars, and now in the sinking funds, should be destroyed, and the tax of one and one-half cents which has been levied on the tax rate be taken off.

The total State debt amounts to \$1,721,632.52. It is offset by resources which leave the net debt \$3,875,965.67. By selling all the State's investments at the present time, its debt would not be more than \$2,500,000, and by 1899 this figure would be a million less, or \$1,500,000.

Extended allusion is made to recent increase of the capital stock of the Baltimore and Ohio railroad, and the additional revenue which the taxation of this increase would bring to the State.

The Governor checks at the B. & O. again in giving a review of Chesapeake and Ohio Canal affairs. He regrets that the lease of the canal property to the Washington and Cumberland Railroad Company was defeated by the intervention of the courts.
