THE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS.

To Senator Robinson is committed the task of regulating the term of county ommissioners under the new law. H is said to favor three commissioners in each county with six year terms so arranged that one commissioner shall be elected biennially. It is also thought advisable to provide in the bill, which will come before the General Assembly, for the conferring of power upon county commissioners to regulate certain local matters at present requiring legislative intervention. These include control of road and bridge legislation, change of district lines and other matters of purely local concern.

"Another matter," says the Baltimore Sun's Annapolis correspondent, "in the same line which is attracting Senator's Robinson's attention is a law providing a proper method and machinery for the prompt collection of taxes and the ac counting for them to the treasury department. Such a law is sorely needed in the State. From almost every county comes the complaint of taxes in arrears and collectors in default. Many favor a general law providing the same method

for each county." It goes without saving that something will be done, whether under local law or general provision, to improve the sysem now in vogue in Howard county. THE TIMES has repeatedly advocated

the treasurer system, whether it be with or without tax collectors. In a small county like Howard, collectors may be dispensed with and upon the treasurer may devolve the duty of collecting. But if the Carroll county system, which gives the treasurer the assistance of collectors, strongly recommends itself to the public, of course there is no reason why it should not be given a trial. The point to be gained is bouded security on the part of the disbursing as well as the receiving authority.
