THE ATTACK ON SENATOR HILL. We have received from the publishers a marked copy of the New York Eyening Post containing a six-column article on Senator David B. Hill. The article is devoted to villification of the Senator's private and public character. It is charged that his associates have always been the scum of creation and that if the late Governor of New York had his deserts he would be in the clutches of the law as a convicted criminal. It is admitted that, although guilty of so much alleged villainy during the Tweed regime, Mr. Hill was later one of the immortal Samuel J. Tilden's most trusted lieutenants, but this fact is slurred over without

attempt to explain the anomaly. The avowed object of the sensational story published in the Evening Post is to stir up factional dissension in the Democratic party, it being presumed that the Post's clieatele is of such a character as to give it the ear of many whose proclivities are Democratic.

For a long time we have entertained the highest respect for the Evening Post, believing it to have been conducted by gentlemen who were honestly independent, and fearless from conviction of right. We now admit with regret that we have been egregiously deceived Had such an article as the one to which we refer come from some sheet notor iously deep in the mire of corrupt polit cal practices and proverbially scurrilous we should not have been surprised. It is a monument of indecency as it is a miserable butchery of English construction to appear in a paper whose workers have heretofore laid some claim to

scholarly attainments. We still have faith that there ar many so-called Mugwumps who ar honest and worthy, but the Mugwump press, so far as the Evening Post is its exemplacis evidently selfish, vicious and dishonest. It is inconceivable that any re putable journal or individual should directly or indirectly sanction malicious assault upon private character for the accomplishment of a political purpose Fortunately such attempted injuries always recoil upon the attempters and so far from hurting, actually benefit

TO GRANT EQUITABLE RELIEF. Petitions from all over the State have cen submitted to the legislature asking that equitable relief be given the ondsmen of the late defaulting treas-

urer, Stevenson Archer, and there is a general disposition to regard the petitions favorably, representing as they do a preponderating sentiment.

The relief sought is not absolute, but io more than appears equitable under the peculiar circumstances of the case. It seems that technically the original bondsmen of Archer have been held by the courts liable for his malfeasance during a period greater than was contemplated in the original bond. Notwithstanding the disposition of the legislature to grant such relief as seems in equity warranted, a difficulty arises in the estimation of those who have looked carefully into the matter. That difficulty is said to come from the clause in the constitution providing that the General Assembly shall not pass a local or special law "to release persons from their debts or obligations to the State unless recommended by the Governor or officers of the treasury department. if the opinion be correct that this prevents the legislature from taking the initiative, it would then be in order, if relief is to be afforded, for the Governor or officers of the treasury department to take such steps as would give the

the hands of the executive officers. It is thought that this is quite in line with the wishes of both the Governo and the treasury officers, as they would prefer the legislature to determine the amount of relief instead of themselves as provided in the present bill.

JEFFERSONIANS DEFINED.

So many people at the present day profess to be this, that or the other, without knowing just exactly what they mean. It is not surprising that such persons by their actions frequently do violence to their most earnest professions, although it must be granted, unwittingly. There are possibly many of the professing political disciples of the immortal Thomas Jefferson who are not at all familiar with every Jeffersonian's confession of faith. It is rarely that we find this so well epitomized as was done by Prof. Jameson in his concluding lec ture last week of a course on Virginia history at the Peabody Institute, Baltimore. He said: "Whoever believes in freedom of politics, freedom of religion, freedom of the press, in the development of the nation through the simple arts of peace, through science and material progress, in government open to the influence of public opinion and economically administered, in hostility to nonopolies, in hospitality to foreign immigrants, in small armaments and a pacific foreign policy; whoever has faith in the indefinite expansion of these ideas upon this continent and the boundless future of the Union founded upon them, he is the disciple of Jefferson."

The Harrison men assume to think that now, beyond all question, Mr. Blaine has disappeared from the field of Presidential possibilities, but the wish may after all be father to the thought. It is true Mr. Blaine has written a little letter which appears in our Washington dis patches, but any one who studies politics knows just how much importance to attach to such letters. When it is known that Mr, Blaine's physical condition renders his Presidential aspirations out of the question we will believe more in his retirement.

The Treasurer System in Kent. Kent county has a law for collecting taxes which works like a charm, says Mr. William B. Usilton, the county treasurer. It saves the county about \$3,500 a year, he says, and closes up each year's business in a definite time. The reasurer there, we believe, is tax colector, and required to sit at stated times in each district to receive taxes. Taxes are due at a specified time, and at another specified time all not paid are put in the hands of the sheriff for collection.-Westminster Democratic Advo
