GORMAN, IF HE WANTS IT.

David Bennett Hill is not the the choice of the Maryland Democra cy for the Presidency, but he appears to have things his own way in New York where his hold upon the popular heart seems truly marvelous.

His unanimous endorsement by the Democratic convention of the Empire State last Monday can not be taken as ndicating that there is a likelihood of his being Democracy's standard bearer in the great national battle of next fall. It does, however, render Mr. Cleveland's | trict. prospects very uncertain. Mr. Cleveland's friends have determined to make an Herculean kick against the action of the regular convention, and the result will be two delegations from New York to the National Convention. - The struggle of these two delegations for recognition is going to make things bad enough in the land of the Knickerbockers, but further recognition to the extent of accepting the candidate of either faction for the Presidency might render New York more doubtful at the coming election than it was in 1888.

It is said that Mr. Cleveland's popularity with the people throughout the Union could overcome the loss of New York State at the election, but this is serious ly to be questioned,

Prudent men seem to recognize that the first requisite of the Democratic candidate must be his ability to carry New York. The peculiar condition now exists of no New Yorker measuring up to the requirements. But it has been truly said that there are a number of men in other States who do, and it is the happy lot of Maryland to possess one of

If Hill and Cleveland have killed each other off in their own State, there is no man in the Union who possesses all the requisites to obtain New York's solid support, with none of the disqualifications which weigh down others, as does Arthur Pue Gorman.

The New York World has pledged itself to the election of a Democratic President, and the World says Gorman can win. Other leading New York papers are of the same opinion. Th disciples of both Cleveland and Hill will follow his lead.

In the event of the nomination going out of New York, we believe Mr. Gorman can get it if he wants it. If h does not want it, we believe such deference is yielded his judgment throughout the length and breadth of this land that he can name the candidate.

But does he want the nomination? That's another question. We feel rafe in saying he does not. His highest ambition we believe is to serve his country faithfully and well in the Senate. But if his party needs him as its standard-bearer, whatever personal sacrifice it may involve, he will stand true to his record and respond.

And Gorman's name will be entwin ed with victory.

Editor of THE TIMES, I beg the cour tesy of your columns for a few remarks on the subject "Agriculture, Governor Brown and the Legislature." As touching the matter of the over-taxed and unprosperous condition of Maryland agriculture, the numerous sales to quit farming, advertised in your columns, are mute but eloquent witnesses. The figures of the census testify to the same truth. The increase of the population of the entire State during the census decade amounted to 107,447. But the city of 162,126, leaving for the whole State outside of Baltimore only 5,331. But if we add the increase of Cumberland and Hagerstown to that of Baltimore it amounts to 107,653; or 206 more than the whole gain for the State. The gain of all the other cities and towns amounts to about 25,000, and this number has been lost by the country population. Charles county actually lost more than 3,000,

Queen Anne's, above 3,000. The loss of rural population is thus shown to extend to all sections of the State. But Baltimore city gained over 13,000 colored population while 17 counties lost nearly ten thousand; disclosing an exodus of the agricultural labor of the State. In the face of these facts the contention that agriculture is merely passing through one of those temporary depressions, which all sorts of business periodically experience has no no force. It is the part of manliness and good sense to look the truth full in the face. The situation is alarming no less than it is distressing. It is in vain to extenuate the matter. It is foolish to attempt to minimize the importance of the facts disclosed by these figures. We must seek first to fully know the nature and extent of the ailment if we hope to prescribe a successful remedy. Evidently this is not a case for the nostrum and
