THE LATE ASSESSMENT BILL. Mr. E. Livezey On Exemptions—"Tax Al and Exempt None." Editor of THE TIMES:

The fate of

the assessment bill continues to excite considerable comment from many quarters throughout the State. Our worthy Governor is censured by many of our people, I think without due consideration. I am in favor of "taxing all and exempting none," yet I think our Governor acted wisely in defeating the new assessment bill. It was to say the least, an inconsistent bill, and if I may so speak, a hypocritical bill, and a fraudulent bill, as to the great mass of our taxpayers. It pretended to be in conformity with the 15th. article of our Bill of Rights, and yet violated the provisions of that article, as it also did Article 36 of our Bill of Rights, and as I understand Governor Brown to say there is sufficient authority (which all sensible men admit) given to us in our Bill of Rights refuses to disclose what property he to tax all this property that escapes taxation, if it was properly exercised by our tax commissioners and assessors. The fault then lies at our tax-payers' doors to-day. No need of any new assessment bill or constitutional "exemption amendment." Behold the inconsist-

ency of the "clamor" for the defeated bill, which exempted boldly in the body of the bill, more than it possibly could gain. We want a tax bill without exemptions, and the tax-payer should be satisfied with nothing else. We want no one-sided view of this question, no privileged class. people by this "clamor" for a fraudulent, expocritical, inconsistent assessment bill (that is dead as it ought to be); while it hunted up, or was trying to do so, personals-which we have the right and power already to tax. The bill exempted millions upon millions of real

The question is asked "Will honest men own property knowingly not assessed?" Let us apply this language to all, as our Bill of Rights and Constitution demands, and see the millions of untaxed real estate owned by churches, institutions of various kinds, and orders incorporated and otherwise receiving the protection of the State, and yet paying nothing. To whom does the charge of "dishonesty" apply? It surely applies, or ought to, to one class as well as to the other. As our 15th Article demands all to be

NEED OF A NEW ASSESSMENT. Lessened.

The question is now being asked-to what extent can relief from present burdens, from the inequalities and hardships resulting from the want of a new assessment, be found in the provisions of the code enacted since the last general assessment law, and for the express purpose, as understood, of supplying a prompt remedy for the defects of an as- experience in catering successfully to sessment which is only made periodically and at long intervals? In 1878 the Legislature passed a law which has never been repealed, and which today stands upon the statute-book as section 137 of article 81 of the code, title "Revenue and Taxes," making it the duty of the county commissioners and of the Appeal Tax Court in this city to annually correct the assessment books by adding new property, whenever dis covered, which has previously escaped assessment and consequent taxation, and also to correct and alter the assessment of individuals in the case of property already assessed, but which may have materially increased or diminished in value since the last assessment. It is Quality—unrivalled! obvious that if this duty were regularly and faithfully performed there would be left very little room for complaint on the score of unjust and unequal assessments, and very little need, perhaps, for a periodical general new assessment of prop-

That the duty has not been performed and that the work of annual correction and revision of the assessment books has not kept pace with changes in the value of property is attributed not so much to any neglect or fault on the part of the county commissioners or judges of the Appeal Tax Court as to the fact, as understood, that these officials have not had at their command the necessary assistance requisite to the proper execu-

tion of such an extensive work. The very general and vague language of the act of 1878 probably led to the enactment in 1884 of the further provision of law which stands as section 145 of the same article 81 of the code. It relates to the manner in which this duty of assessing newly discovered property and correcting the errors of previous assess ments shall be performed. It requires that before putting any new property on the assessment books or increasing the assessment of any property already assessed the county commissioners or the Appeal Tax Court, as the case may be, shall give notice, by printed or writ-

He may then be questioned orally or upon printed interrogatories, and if he answers must do so under oath. If he and has a little son named after the fails to appear or refuses to answer, the ex-President. county commissioners or the Appeal Tax Court may then assess or revalue his property, according to their best judgment and information in the premses. It will be noticed that this is essentially different from the "listing" feature of the late assessment bill, which provided penalties of fine and imprisonment for a refusal to answer, and which gave to the assessors the powers which he act of 1884 only confers upon the county commissioners and judges of the Appeal Tax Court themselves. There is no provision in the law for delegating any of these powers of putting questions, requiring answers under oath and assessing property to any subordinates, whether assessors or bailiffs. The law also differs from the so-called "dooming" system, which permits a person who may own which is subject to taxation, but has escaped assessment, to be arbitrarily assessed as worth so much money and required to pay taxes upon that amount unless he can show that his property actually does not amount to so much. The act of 1884 seemingly confines the commissioners and the Appeal Tax Court to an assessment of the specific property which the recusant taxpayer may own, and which they are authorized to put upon the books. The provisions of existing law may be, therefore, defective, considered as means designated to accomplish a certain end. It is probable, however, that these defects would be less seriously felt and the operation of the law prove more satisfactory in the counties than in this city because the field to be covered would be much smaller. Nevertheless, the city will watch with interest the result in the counties and be, doubtless,
