SENATOR GORMAN ON THE NAVY, The most notable event of the week in Congress has been a speech by Senator Gorman plainly stating that under the laws, and because of naval construction begun, the expenses of the present term would mount up to as much as

Mr. Gorman went on to say that it would never do to with-hold such appropriations as were necessary to continue the work of ship-building already under way. That, beginning just prior to Mr. Cleveland's administration, and continued during it, work upon a naval equipment had been and was still in progress, which was calculated to give us the finest navy that floats the water. Having once undertaken this work, he was unwilling, for political capital or from any ulterior motive, to paralyze the industries which the work has quicken-

ed into life. It was true, he said, that the outlay necessary, with the provisions of laws on the statute books, which had to be obeyed, would make the appropriations larger than he or Democrats would like to see, but the responsibility for the laws in question was upon the Republican party, and would remain there until the Democrats were given control of every branch of the Govern-

In Mr. Gorman's absence at Senator Barbour's funeral, Monday, some of his party colleagues criticised his course in admitting that appropriations amount ing to \$500,000,000 by the present Congress, would be necessary. Upon his return the following day the Senator from Maryland spiritedly took up these criti cisms, handling the matter in his usua

masterly manner. He said that he did not believe in concealing the truth from the people It had always been his plan to take the confidence, and the truth at any cost. He regretted deeply that Repub lican legislation had so borne upon the treasury as to threaten deprivation of funds needed for the maintenance of the Government's dignity, but at the same time he could not be one to sanction the least depreciation of that dignity, and unpleasant as the facts of the Govern ment's financial needs might be, he was bound to make them known.
