To Fly the American Flag.

The House of Representatives has passed a bill to grant registers as vessels of the United States to such foreignbuilt steamships of 8,000 tons and 20 knots speed as were owned by Ameri can citizens on January 1, 1890. The ships expected to fly the American flagunder this bill, if it becomes a law, are the "Ocean greyhounds," the City of New York and the City of Paris. These ships were built in Scotland for the Inman and International Navigation Company, which is said to be controlled by Pennsylvanians. It is not stated whether they are to be "imported" duty free. If they are, the precedent might, says the Baltimore Sun, be followed with advantage in other lines of manufacture. But the act is a step of progress, Only by buying cheap ships can our ship-owners compete with foreign shipowners on the high seas.

Nevada Wedded to Free Coinage The Democratic State Convention of Nevada declared its unalterable devotion to bi-metallism and the free and unlimted coinage of silver.
