REPUBLICAN CONVENTIONS

Congressional Candidates to Be Chosen New Primaries in Howard County. The Republican State central commitee met at Dushane Post Hall, Baltimore, Tuesday and selected delegates for the congressional district convention as follows:

August 18, at 12 o'clock. Second district-Brooke's Hall, on Druid Hill avenue, Baltimore city, Wednesday, August 21, at 12 o'clock. Third district-On Tuesday, August

30, at 12 o'clock, at some place hereafter selected Fourth district, China Hal., Baltimore, on Wednesday, August 31, at 12 o'clock.

Fifth district-Laurel, Tuesday, September 6, at 12 o'clock. Sixth district-Cumberland, Wednesday, August 10, at 12 o'clock. The time and place for holding the

ratification meeting was referred to the executive committee.

A special committee of one from each county recommended that the State committee recognize the congressional delegates already chosen in Anne Arundel and Howard counties. In these counties congressional delegates were chosen at the same convention that elected delegates to the last State convention. They gave as a reason for doing so the wish to avoid the expense of another primary election. In Somerset and Wicomico counties the county conventions adjourned, subject to the call of the chairman, to select congressional delegates. When the resolutions were read Mr. Bradley of Somerset, and Mr. Higgins, of Talbot, asked that the action of the Somerset and Wicomico conventions be also ratified by the central committee. This led to a prolonged debate, in which it was shown that all four of these counties had exceeded their authority. The last call of the committee, t was contended, only provided for the election of delegates to the State convention. Therefore the action in Anne Arundel, Howard, Somerset and Wicomico counties was illegal and should not stand. The resolution of the committee relating to Anne Arundel and Howard counties was rejected, and it was decided that new primaries will have to be held to select delegates to the congressional conventions. The committee then adiourned.
