Mr. Carnegle Gets the Kernel and Give His Workmen Husks. At the Congressional investigation at Pittsburg President Weihe of the Amalgamated Association testified that the amount of labor employed to produce a ton of steel costs \$1.55. The McKinley bill "protects" Mr. Carnegie with a duty of \$11.20 a ton, or enough to enable him to pay \$11.20 a ton for the labor in making it-provided the tariff rate is meant exclusively for labor's benefit. If half of the tariff rate is for the capitalist and the other half for the laborer, then the latter ought to get \$5.60 where President Weihe says he gets \$1.55. This tariff rate of \$11.20 is really prohibitory. It keeps out foreign steel such as Mr. Carnegie makes. The price of the Carnegie billets of steel at Pittsburg is \$23.-50 a ton. The price in Liverpool is \$20.-65 a ton. With the duty added the Eng-
