WOULD DICTATE FORBEARANCE. There is some speculation as to the ef fect of the complications threatened in the public school system of Howard county upon the entire system of the State of Maryland.

The old board of this county disputes the right of the new to assume its duties of office, and seeks to clog the wheels of the school machinery by refusing to surrender the room heretofore used for the dispatch of business. If the new Howard county board is not legally constituted, neither is any other school board in Maryland, for all have organized within the past week under the general law of 1892. Interfer ence then with the new board here on legal grounds, if valid, may mean to paralyze entirely public education through-

out the State. This would be a most lamentable condition and reparation could scarcely be made in a long time. If the school law of 1892 is invalid, and the old law is unconstitutional, it might be necessary upon the establishment of these facts to convene the legislature at a cost of thousands of dollars to set things right.

The good of the public schools, consideration of taxpayers, who have to bear the expense, patriotism and common sense would dictate forbearance on the part of those who would upset the turn ten days from day of sale and on return journey will be valid to stop off

Retaliation. There is a great stir on the Pacific coast, caused by the announcement that the government of Victoria, Australia, has undertaken to retaliate for the Mc-Kinley bill. The blow falls largely upon the Pacific coast. The duty on Oregon pine has been increased to \$6.25 per thousand feet and that upon canned atestations on Sunday, July 31st, and fruit to ilfteen cents a can. What makes this latter tax the more exasperating is the fact that for several years past California has been building up an excellent market for their canned fruit in Australia, and Victoria's tariff is prohibitory Has the United States a right to expec any different treatment? The avowed purpose of the McKinley bill was to shut out from the United States the products of other countries. Why should we expect other countries to buy our goods if we refuse to buy theirs? No trade can long remain one sided, and if all countries should parsue the policy of shutting out the products of all other countries commerce would cease and each land would have to depend upon its own products and we would be reduced to the condition of savage nations. That is the logical outcome of prohibitory tariffs-the destruction of commerce.-Bal-

Wages and the Tariff. The claim that our high protective tariff does anything to increase the wages of the workers in protected industriesfor it is not asserted that others can be benefited by it-has long been seen to be a sham and a fraud by all intelligent men who have looked at the matter without being blinded by partisan prejudice and bigotry. And now the New York World has conclusively shown this truth in such a shape that even partisans cannot fail to comprehend it. It devotes ten columns to printing a list of the 500 strikes against wage reductions that have occurred in our protected industries since the McKinley tariff taxes began to be enforced. And not a single instance of increase of wages has been or can be shown. There may be narrow-minded patisans who still take some stock in this delusion about the tariff increasing wages, but it is safe to say that there are no intelligent workmen among them. -Saratoga Sun, N.
