Hon. George L. Wellington has been nominated for Congress by the Republicans of the Sixth district against Hon. Wm. M. McKaig, nominated by the Democrats. The district comprises Garrett, Allegany, Washington, Frederick and Montgomery counties. McComas carried it in 1888 by a plurality of 1,634. McKaig in 1890 reversed this plurality and carried the district by a narrow margin of 165 votes. Prior to his defeat by McKaig, McComas had carried the district three times. In 1884 Blaine re ceived a plurality of 490 in the counties comprising the district, and in 1888 Harrison obtained 1,338 more votes than Cleveland. But the situation in 1892 is more favorable to Democratic success than in 1888. The nomination of Cleveland places the issues of tariff reform, local self government and honest ad ministration squarely before the people of the Sixth district.
