A TANGLE IN ANOTHER COUNTY. Washington county is just now confronted with a tangle in its school affairs similar to that which has been attempted

in Howard. For twenty-four years Mr. Peter A. Witmer has been secretary and treasurer to the board of county school commissioners and examiner of public schools. When the new board was appointed, under the act of 1892, in Washington county, as in Howard and all the other counties of the State, Mr. Witmer became a candidate for re-election. The result of the board's first meeting was a deadlock, but at another meeting, on Wednesday, an election was reached, Mr. Witmer being defeated by Mr. Frank W. Mish, a brilliant and scholarly young lawyer. The vote stood four for Mish and two for Witmer,

Instead of gracefully accepting the re sult of the contest he had entered, Mr. Witmer showed his teeth and refused to surrender his office, coolly informing the school commissioners that he did not recognize them as a constitutional body.

It is assumed that steps will be taken at once to oust Mr. Witmer, as it is not the cause of public education has developed sufficiently in a quarter century to induce him to recede from his position and refrain from raising a legal quibble, for selfish reasons, although the public school machinery of the State be thereby paralyzed. Mr. Witmer evidently be longs to that class of willing public servants of whom it has been truly said: "Few die and none resign."

A noteworthy circumstance is that Mr. Witmer was a warm advocate of the pres ent law governing the appointment of school commissioners when it was before the legislature last winter.

It appears that the old school board i playing a minor role in the Washington county controversy and Mr. Witmen its mere employe, appears as leading man, attempting the brilliant and difficult exemplification of how the tail can wag the dog.

THE CONGRESSIONAL OUTLOOK. It is said that in spite of Hon. Barnes Compton's expressed unwillingness to be again a candidate for Congress, and preference for something imposing lighter burdens, if his friends insist that he must continue to render public service, there are indications of a stampede to him at Laurel next Wednesday. Be this as it may, he is the only magnet that can draw the convention simultaneously from a Howard county loadstone. There is Congressional timber in this county and our delegates should not forget it. A little discreet work on their part among their fellow delegates might be productive of material results. It is not our province to suggest a candidate. Let the will of Howard county be registered. Find out from the people whom they want, and then do their will. To ascertain that will, our columns have been, as always, open to all, and this week, as well as last, food for thought in connection with the Congressional outlook, is to be found in THE TIMES.
