THE PUBLIC SCHOOL TROUBLES. The most important, as well as the most serious matter in Howard county just now is the trouble in the public school system. The old school board has ceased to act, but the school property, necessary to the proper discharge of the new board's duties, has not been turned over, although a month has been taken to consider the new board's demand for

This demand was formally made by the new board, upon its going into office, early in August. Frequent meetings were held in that month in the hope of obtaining a reply, but in vain. Only last Monday did the old board see fit to meet in consultation. Mr. J E. Hill, the secretary of the new board, appeared before the old to receive its answer, but was informed that there was no formal reply to make beyond individual information from Mr. Wm. Mackintosh, president of the old board, that the school property could not be turned over, as Mr. John T. Thompson, the late secretary, treasurer and examiner, had

determined not to give it up. a reply, Mr. Hill, as the official representative of the new board, insisted upon a formal response from the old board as a body, if such they assumed to be, to the demand of the new. After considerable deliberation with closed doors, reply was made in a resolution, which appears in another column, and which repeated in substance what Mr. Mackintosh

had informally stated. This resolution was passed by a vote of two to one, Mr. Mackintosh and Dr. W. B. Gambrill voting for it and Mr. Le Page Cronmiller against it. In explaining the resolution Mr. Mackintosh went on to say that the board had nothing to do with Mr. Thompson's action. That he acted in his independent official capacity. That the board as such was out of the controversy. That a majority, at least, of its members did not expect ever to meet again, and that he and Mr. Le Page Cronmiller, constituting this majority, would promptly resign if genuine. The commissioners have referred the matter to their counsel, who promises to advise them as to their course as early as possible. One thousand dollars is the present

If by the commissioners' action the school board can feel warranted to borrow money, all may be well and the schools of the county continue ia session.
