WHAT THEY FAIL TO POINT TO. What is the use of our Republican friends attempting specious argum<mark>ents</mark>? With affected pride they point to the prosperity of the country and say, " see there!" They fail, however, to point to the whole country and the seven thousand millionaires which have come into existence during these thirty years of Republican policy. They fail to point to the fact that the farming interests have suffered beyond precedent and that the "country gentleman" is a thing of the past. They fail to point to the government statistics of Ohio, which show that while the general wealth of the State has increased over two hundred millions the value of farm property has decreased nearly that much. They fail to point to the fact that while one person is benefitted by the Mckinley tariff twenty persons are harmed. It is either an idiotic or a barefacedly dishonest proposition to say that we can saddle the country with an annual debt of over five hundred millions -nearly two million a day-and no a grinding oppression, too. Investigation shows that the poor man's dollar is taxed from ten to twenty per cent.; the man of moderate income is taxed the same, and all who are outside of the protected class are paying tribute to monopoly, and, having been bled, drop by drop, during these years of Republican rule, they are beginning to feel that the Assyrian is abroad in the land.

We reiterate that there are some things that Republican writers and orators will fail to point to. This country, developing from the sheer force of our restlessness and industry bound to grow. But it was designed to be the freest government on earth from any kind of oppression. It is evident the wolf has crept into the fold and the result is consternation, discouragement, strikes, contempt for law and general distrust.

All signs indicate that there has been a revulsion of feeling in favor of Democratic teachings-that the Democratic party is the party of the people.


