WHAT IT MEANS. Notwithstanding we are on the eye of the most important presidential election ever held in this country there exists an apathy among the people. We are inclined to the latter view. Enthusiasm for candidates or party has waned in the proportion that newspapers have permeated the country. There was a time not many years since when the county newspaper was all that the farmer or mechanic had time to read. It is different now. There are few households at the present time to which several publications, often the daily newspaper, do not go. It is natural then that while people are reading so much they should also think, and, consequently, be in a position to make up their minds upon the various topics under discussion

without the necessity of listening to an

Mr. Cleveland, four years since, seeing that the people had been drawn into the vortex of "protection" through subtile reasoning and false representation, more than intimated that the Democrats could win only through educa tional campaigns-that were the people once well informed as to the selfish designs of the Republican party and the unsoundness of a protective policy, they would turn about and inaugurate a new and different policy. Never has a question been so thoroughly discussed by the newspapers and from the rostrum sometimes assuming Titanic proportions when we consider the quality of intellect employed.
