OUR LAST BUGLE CALL. Before this issue of THE TIMES will have reached all of its readers the die will be cast. The people of the United States will have made their choice in the presidential contest. We think we can detect the mutterings of an earthquakesee the Republican party utterly wreck\_ ed, stranded and demoralized. The claims of the Democratic party are such as to command the attention of every thinking man of the nation, who, as we have said before, is not blinded by ignorance or partisan feeling.
