Over All Opposition. Washington, Nov. 9 .-- A compilation of the election returns for Congressmen made up from reports published in the morning papers and from later telegrams received up to noon today give the Democrats a majority over the Republicans in the next House of 77 and over both with eleven districts put in the doubtful column. The returns as yet, of course, are very incomplete, and changes will have to be made in the figures on each show the defeat of a number of Congressmen now said to be elected and vice versa. The figures, however, clearly indicate that the next House of Representatives will be Democratic by a good large working majority, which will doubtless finally be found to be some where from sixty to eighty. According to the present compilation there will be 207 Democrats, 130 Republicans and eight Third party men in the next House with eleven additions yet to be made to complete the quota of 356 members. There were in the last House 235 Democrats, 88 Republicans and 9 Independents, or 332 members in all. The result is a relative gain for the Republicans as compared with the tremendous landslide of two years ago, so that the Republicans will need more than two aisles in the national legislative chamber for their members.
