The Senate Cannot be Stolen.

The Republican Senators are apparently determined to do all in their power to help their local partisans steal the Senatorships in five Western States. They will not succeed. The conspiracy will be defeated. The State-stealers will not organize the Senate.

At present the Democrats have thirtynine Senators, the Farmers' Alliance or Populists two and the Republicans forty-seven. Eleven Democrats go out. Their successors will all be Democrats. In addition, the Democrats will gain a Senator in New York in place of Mr. Hiscock and another in Wisconsin in place of Mr. Sawyer. These will make the count as follows: Democrats, 41; Nocubscription discontinued until all arrears re paid. Republicans, 45, and Farmers' Alliance,

Nineteen Republican Senators go out eighteen by expiration of their terms. and one-Perkins, of Kansas-by reason of the fact that he was appointed to fill a vacancy until the meeting of the Legislature. If the Republicans should succeed in stealing this State before the 4th of March the totals given above would not be changed.

There are, however, four other states o be reckoned with. In California the Republicans are in a confessed minority which nothing but bribery can overcome. It is not probable that Senator Stanford's threat will be successfully carried out. The anti-Republicans will gain a Senator from California, who will doubtless be a Democrat on the tariff issue and probably on all other issues This will make the count stand: Repub. licans, 44; anti-Republicans, 44.

Even if no other State should change the opposition will organize the Senate by the casting vote of the Vice-Presi-

In Nebraska, however, there will probably be an anti-Republican elected, because the Democrats and Populists have together on joint ballot a majority of eight. In Montana and Wyoming there is no doubt that the majorities in the Logislatures are against the Republicans. The change of three Senators from these States would make the division 41 Republicans and 47 anti-Republicans. If we add Senator Stewart, of Nevada, chosen as a Populist, the count will be 48 to 40. If the schism in North Dakota increases fatally to the Republicans it will be 49 to 39.

The republican Senators have undertaken a very large contract in attempting to steal the Senate and if their opponents are as vigilant and determined thecountry, but we have not yet seen as they seem inclined to be and as they ought to be they will not succeed .- New York World.

From the London Telegraph Not a sigh seems to havefollowed Jay Gould to the other world; no one-ou of his family circle-has a good word, a parting regret for the dead billionaire. On the contrary, a feeling of relief appears to pervade all America to know that the colossal incubus of his merciless genius for money-grabbing is taken away from the railway market. The despatches from New York show plainly that people are breathing freely again because the financial monster and terror is no more

How strange and sad an epitaph is this national satisfaction upon the extraordinary career of the "Napolean of the Stock Exchange!" In the incessant pursuit of boundless wealth he spared nobody. He would ruin his partner or wreck a company with equal taciturnity he has bought with his prodigious opuor two ways-in his magnificent steam Hudson—he spent a little of his atiluence rather lavishly; but he had no tastes, no pursuits, no fancy or feeling for any thing except the perpetual accumulation of his useless hoards, and was so lost in the mere game of speculation that its gigantic proceeds were little more to

him than counters. As it stands, the great speculator serves chiefly to illustrate the saying of Emerson that very few men know how to be rich. Jay Gould knew better than anybody of his time and nation how to become rich, by putting aside all scruples and playing the game of acquisition to the bitter end, just inside the limits of the financial law. His wealth, however, was of no more use to him, or to his age, than if it had been like the dead leaves of the Arabian story, and does not seem to have brought him a single real friend. The stock markets of the United States gave one little drop in values, like a gasp of surprise, as though they thought lay Gould might have bribed death itself to let him go on indefinitely. Then they instantly re-covered all round, as it to emphasize the belief that to have him dead and gone was good for everybody and everything; and so his countrymen have dismissed to eternity the master of \$150,060,000.
