WASHINGTON LETTER. From Our Regular Correspondent.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3.-Hon. Don M. Dickinson, who is regarded as Presidentelect Cleveland's personal representative, is in Washington working in the interest of the Andrews bill for the repeal of the Sherman silver law, which is to be taken up in the House on Thursday and Friday next. Mr. Dickinson is outken in favor of the annexation of Hawaii, and in this he is in line with seven-tenths of Congress, without regard to politics. The Hawaiian Commissioners arrived to-day, and to-morrow they will present their petition for annexa-There are so many complications that would have to be met if an act of Congress annexing Hawaii is to be passed, and in the course of the delay, which would necessarily ensue, some foreign government might, by a revolution or other means, secure control of the country, that it is probable that the outcome will be the adoption of some quicker method of asserting American control and warning foreign governments to keep their hands off. There is no politics in this, simply Americanism, and be it said to his credit, Mr. Harrison has consulted as freely with prominent Democrats in Congress as with members of his own party. Notwithstanding the threat cabled from London as to what England intended to do, it can be stated without exaggeration that the intentions of England or any other nation is cutting po figure whatever in this matter. Hawaii is going to pass under the control of the United States. That much is certain, but it is not yet decided just how it is to be done. Another certainty in the situation is, that Hawaiian sugar producers will not be paid the bounty of 2 cents per pound now paid to Americans under the McKinley law, which some allege to have been the cause of the revolution and application for annexation. Whatever the cause, there are many good reasons for our not neglecting the opportunity to get control of

the islands. The majority report of the House Judiciary Committee, which investigated the Homestead labor troubles, has attracted wide attention. It was written by Representative Boatner, of Louisiana, who says therein that he finds nothing in the Constitution which authorizes Congress to interfere with, regulate or prohibit the employment of Pinkerton or other detectives, by persons or corporations, except so far as they may be engaged in inter-State commerce. "The trouble at Homestead," continues the report, "was beyond Federal or Congressional jurisdiction. To permit the interference of the Federal authorities, without demand by the States, or to make laws which would control or affect the relations of employer and employe in the States, would be to undermine the just authority of the States and to interpose Federal authority upon a subject of which the States have, and ought to have,

The Chinese Exclusion Act.

The Scientific American of recent date, n commenting on the Chinese Exclusion Act, says: The exclusion or restriction of immigration from the Orient, with its hundreds of millions of aliens, may be necessary. The immense Chinese empire could pour out upon our shores an entire population of their race without feeling the difference. The good qualities of the Chinese are undoubted, but they do not assimilate with the Caucafound homes for their children. Their stay here is merely an exile submitted to as a business venture. They bring with them nothing that can be of profit to us They leave behind them nothing except work executed by them as laborers.

Our nation of sixty millions of people is threatened by another problem in the race question. Already the existence among us of some eight millions of negroes is regarded by political economists as the basis of a very difficult problem. the Chinese immigration question. In both cases there are unassimilatable races of small capitalization. But with the Chinese there is present the additional difficulty that they simply desire to send in floods of temporary residents, with almost limitless sources of supply of new immigrants to crowd out our own people from many avenues of trade and

If a permanent population of eight millions of negroes, not re-enforced by immigration, is enough to constitute difficulty for political economists to dis pose of, what may we not be confronted with in a floating population of indefinite capability of extension? It cer tainly seems that we are entitled to adopt some measures of restriction. But the humanitarian aspect of the case ells against the present law. A year's imprisonment is the measure of criminality of simple residence. This

s certainly a measure unworthy of a ivilized people. It fairly savors of ferocity to imprison for so long a period one whose offense is mere existence The decision that the act is unconstitutional in one particular serves to emphasize its broad injustice. By no principle of justice can the presence of an inoffensive person in a country be construed as crime. The expulsion of the Jews from Russia is really the only instance of the present day that is comparable with the action of the United States as dictated by the Chinese expulsion laws. The limitation of the numbers coming here could be otherwise brought about. poll tax could be levied on every hinese entering the country. This could be made high enough to deter

them from coming here in large numbers. Already many murmurs of dissatisfac tion are making themselves heard. It is felt that the Chinese government may adopt retaliatory measures which wil make themselves felt upon American residents of China. Independent of the fear of such action the injustice and inhumanity of the act should suggest its amendment. Laws proposed as substitutes of increased severity should be dis couraged. Excessive immigration would be amenable to more logical and juster methods of treatment.

The Maryland Training School for Feeble Minded. In 1883 the Legislature at Annapolis passed an act creating and providing for he maintenance of a training school for he feeble minded of the State. A farm of nearly two hundred acres near Owings Milis, Md., with comfortable lwelling, was purchased, and the school opened. Since then a handsome buildng has been erected and the accommodations improved. An increased number can now be provided for. The school is in good working order, and the beneficial results of careful mental and physical training can be readily seen by my one sufficiently interested to visit the institution and investigate the methods of instruction. Indeed, in many cases the results seem almost wonderful to those unacquainted with the work. Some children who were unable to learn even the alphabet in ordinary schools have, in a comparatively short time learned to spell, read, write and do simple examples in arithmetic. 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
