The selection by Mr. Cleveland of Judge Gresham as his Secretary of State has brought out some adverse criticism in the Democratic party. The Nova Scotia Purchase.

The purchase of the Nova Scotia coni-fields by a company of American millionaires is said by those who are interested in the enterprise to mean cheaper coal for the country and the revival of the iron industries of New England.

These great coal deposits have not been properly worked by reason of a lack of capital and the discrimination of our tariff laws. The duty of 75 cents a ten has stood in the way of the coal production and has put out the fires of many American furnaces. The necessities and desires of the Massachusetts and Rhode Island manufacturers were formulated in a petition presented to Congress during the pendency of the

McKinley Tariff bill. Heretofore the manufacturers of New England have been obliged to depend on the bituminous coal and coke of Ohio and Pennsylvania. They are now promised by the purchasers of the Nova Scotia mines a competition of the bituminous coal of the Maritime Provinces. which is not only a better coal, producing better coke, but is nearer the New England ports so far as cost of transportation is concerned.

Mr. Gorman's Warning.

During the debate in the Senate on Monday on the Sundry Civil Appropriation Bill, Hon A. P. Gorman said that the condition which confronted the country was such that he did not see how the Senate could possibly increase expenditures. Congress had been exceedingly liberal in regard to public buildings. In his belief, Congress had exceeded the point which it ought go. There was already eleven million dollars authorized to be expended for public build

ings. "We are," continued Mr. Gorman, "in front of a condition serious and alarming, and which brought Senators together to provide against a disaster. I am a firm believer that we have only touched the borders of this trouble, and that the real trouble is that the revenue laws do not produce sufficient money to pay the expenses of the government as low fixed. And I believe that before July next extraordinary action wil have to be taken by the men who control the financial establishment of the government to meet the emergency, or else Congress will have-to reassemble and meet it by making adequate provision."

The Treasury and the Gold Reserve. When the Republicans went to Washington four years ago the vaults of the Treasury were so full that "all the world wondered." The nations of Europe, over-burdened by taxes, couldn't comprehend such a condition of affairs. They are so much behind hand when their balance sheets are made up that a large surplus seemed little less a miracle. The money in the Treasury, however, began to melt like snowflakes in the sun soon after the Republicans settled down to work. A few millions here and a few more there showed that the flood tide had given way to a strong ebb. As matters stand now we make a mighty poor showing. Mr. Cleveland can easily see the ottom of the vaults.

During January the gold reserve sank from one hundred and twenty-one million to one hundred and eight million dollars. That is an omniously rapid decline, and the business men of the country, irrespective of party, are beginning to declare that the people were quite right when they cast their ballots in November .- N. 
