THE ROAD AND TAX QUESTIONS. Some Pertinent Points Both Pithy and Piquant.

EDITORS OF THE TIMES: Anything calculated to arouse our people to the necessity of improving our public roads meets with my hearty approval. I can join hands with the bicycle move, the theorist, or in fact with any fellow or set of fellows to get out of the mud. We all agree and vote unanimously in favor of hard solid road beds. But when confronted with the vast amount of money necessary to get us out of the ruts, we hesitate, and then the road business ends for the time being. If some of our rich men would loan the county money at a very low interest, designating what road the money was to be used upon, the road to be given his or her name in consideration

of his or her philanthropic act, the road would ever remain to him a monument more lasting than marble. The generous donor's praise would be sung from generation to generation. But as there is no hope from this source, and the stern reality must be met: llow to get the eash? two plans have been suggested, one by the issuing of bonds, the other by saddling a tax of fifteen or twenty cents in addition to the present high tax rate, and thribling the amount now spent on the roads. This plan, from the money properly spent, would take one hundred years to put the roads in good shape. The bonded system can be worked without one cent of additional tax, and built at once, provided we could get a new assessment law. But for some unaccountable reason our last two Governors have vetoed every assessment bill, and, as a consequence, our basis of taxation has increased but very little during the last seventeen years. It is said that liars may figure, but figures never lie.

By referring to the tax collector's pooks of the Third and Fourth districts of this county, I find the property assessed in the Third district (one of the smallest in the county) to be \$1,173,584, while in the Fourth district (one of the largest and richest) it is only \$1,155,325, nearly \$18,000 less than the Third. I have not examined the taxable basis of the four ther districts, but it is fair to presume that this unfair showing, as between the Third and Fourth, may be found in other listricts. Under a new assessment our basis for the whole county ought to be between ten and eleven million dollars. and at sixty-five cents, six cents less than our present rate, would give us nearly sixteen thousand dollars more than at present. This addition to the amount of our present road tax would give us for road purposes twenty-five thousand dollars, at one hundred dollars per mile, and taking the principal roads would, if properly spent, help the appearance of two hundred and fifty miles of roads wonderfully, or would pay the interest on three hundred thousand dol-
