To See the Fair Cheapty.

A leading Chicago newspaper has taken the pains to figure out the cost of a lodays' visit to the exposition as a little less than \$19, including admission to the grounds, entrance into all the side shows and concessions, rides on all the sliding railways, etc. This allows for fares from the heart of the city and back and 50 cents a day for luncheon, which last item may certainly be reduced one-half. The 50 cents admission to the grounds grants entrance to all the main buildings (14 of them and their annexes) with their exhibits, any one of which would repay hours' or even days' study; to all the foreign buildings, except those on the Midway plaisance, and to the different

state buildings. There is ample provision made within the grounds in the way of stations for rest and refreshment. The bureau of public com-fort of the World's Columbian exposition has established waiting rooms in every part of the grounds, with parlors for ladies and children, after the manner of a first class railway station, with bureaus of information free of charge, and there is a well uipped and thoroughly organized emergency hospital on the grounds. The bureau of public comfort provides telegraphic service, telephones and messenger boys at the usual rates and sells stationery and other small necessaries, checks parcels and provides guides at moderate charges.

The Woman's building ma es especial provision for the comfort of women at the exposition, and the Children's building across the way is designed for the entertainment of children and the instruction of their mothers. There will be plenty of lunch counters and dining rooms, where you may buy whatever you like, from a cap of coffee or a glass of milk to a square meal, and pay accordingly .- Mrs. Moses P. Handy in Ladies' Home Journal.

About 3 o'clock in the afternoon I took a bus at Parliament street and climbed on top to enjoy the fresh breeze and the movement of the streets. This was the prime minister of England and his wife going for an airing in the park. The extreme simplicity of the turnout was impressive. The single horse was a common bred, awkward limbed roan. I have often reen better under a farmer's side car in Ire-

land. The only sign of state, and that was no more than the state of a simple genticman, was the two servants on the box. "There he goes," said the bus driver, with a glance back at his passengers. "The great-est man in the world, by gosh! Say, Jim" (this to the conductor, whom he heard just then on the roof taking fares), "see the Old Man? There's the man as is going to give peace and prosperity to your country," from which remark I gathered that his friend Jim was an Irishman.

By this time the victoria was just alongside the bus on the roadway below, and Mrs. Gladstone, happening to look up, the driver took the opportunity to crook his elbow and give her a professional salute. All the passengers on the roof without exception took off their hats. Mrs. Gladstone called her husband's attention, whereupon he, looking up, returned the courtesy with old fashioned grace. The strong features after their momentary relaxation relapsed into their firm, almost stony expression, and one received a vivid impression of the power and greatness of that massive face as it contrasted with the throngs of insignificant physiognomies passing to and fro on pathway and roadway. eminence.-London Cor. Beston Pilot. Women Voters of Wyoming. I found that the great majority of the vomen in Wyomingare in the habit of voting. Not all of them vote as their husbands do, and, as one official expressed himself, "good men pride themselves upon not influencing their wives." Yet it is true, I am told, that very many women, of their own volition and unconsciously, copy the politics of their husbands. Occasionally the men of the state hear of women who refuse to embrace the privilege, who do not believe that women should meddle in affairs which concern the homes, the prosperity and the self respect and credit of the communities of which they are a part, but such women

are of course few. Among the women who show an intelliities, a few resort to the stump and speak for whichever cause they have adopted. But there are many who serve side by side with the men as delegates to conventions and voters in the party primaries. In the last state convention of the Republicans there were three women delegates. In that party's last county convention in Laranic county the secretary was a woman, and three delegates were of her sex. Women literally flock to the primaries-in the cities, at al events. At the primary meeting in the Third ward of Cheyenne last autumn out of 183 who were present at least 80 were women. In the other wards the proportion of women was as one is to three. On election days the women go a-voting precisely as they go a shopping elsewhere. On foot or in their carriages they go to the polls, where, under the law, there are no crowds and where all is quict and orderly. There s no doubt that female suffrage has an im

proving effect upon politicians and their manners.—Julian Ralph in Harper's. A Good Time to Wear Loose Shoes. Women who consider their good looks as well as their comfort always wear shoes : size larger in summer than in winter. The feet, in spring weather especially, seem to respond to the languor of the rest of the frame-they are less clastic and less firm they expand in size because they are relaxed in muscle, and they are causes of gentin torture to the saleswoman behind the counter as well as to the finely dressed customer before it. From a lecture delivered recently before the Berlin Geographical society by Herr Thoroddhitherto unknown group of lakes to the vest of the glaciers of Vatua Jokull has been discovered by him. Thoroddsen em ployed 10 sunfmers in making himself acpuainted with the interior of Iceland, and during these 10 journeys he was about 500 days in the saddle. It was necessary to be provided with food for himself and food for his horses, as he had endless deserts to cross and met with very few human dwellings. Before July there is no possibility of traveling, the ground being too soft with snow water. Even in summer there are often terrible storms, and the glacier rivers are difficult to pass. There are, by the way, five printing presses in Iceland; 10 news-papers and eight magazines are published, and that the Icelanders have a great impulse to intellectual production is proved by the fact that the 12,000 Icelanders who immigrated to Manitoba have founded 12 newspapers in their new colony, .
