INCIDENTS OF OUR CIVILIZATION. Modern invention has given us many conveniences and toned down the severity of life in many ways, but death is frequently lurking in ways little suspected. The wholesale destruction to human life has become mighty, often heartrending, to what it was when our habits were simpler. The touch of the prow of one ironelad against the side of another causes it to go down and four hundred of the flower of the English nation go to the bottom almost instantly. A building for many years supposed to be substantial suddenly collapses and many clerks are either hilled or wounded. A few days ago one of the largest structures on the World's Fair grounds takes fire and the firemen were compelled to ascend to an abnormal height and the consequence is twenty gallant men lose their lives being compelled to accept the terrible alternative of roasting alive or jumping a hundred feet; all this before the gaze of 35,000 people powerless to help. The demand for coal causes men to descend into the very bowels of the earth and the monotonous announcement is periodically heralded that hundreds have lost their lives in moment. Great ships go out laden often with a thousand or more souls and, steaming at a speed of twenty or more miles an hour, are in daily danger of going to the bottom. Railroad trains everywhere are constantly speeding at the rate of fifty and sixty miles an hour with only the flange of a wheel between the passengers and death. In the large cities death, often violent, lurks in hundred forms. A loose wire may be dangling along the street. Some one touches it and he drops dead. Such is the serious side of modern life. The people, however, are unmindful of it all. The train never goes too fast. The cable car may be a veritable juggernaut but the busy, restless citizen must have rapid transit at all hazards. Out of the myriads who now swarm in all civilized countries what effect has the loss of a few hundred human beings? A surprise and a momentary horror is experienced and the victims pass out of existence and not a ripple on the surface of human society lives to commemorate for a moment that such and such ever lived except in rare individual cases. In this age the world is busy-too

busy to be turned aside or checked by what are now considered as mere incidents of our civilization, as horrifying as they may be.

After all there is a majesty in our way of doing things. A utility runs through everything we touch. Sentiment finds no place in the mad press of progress toward attaining even greater things. Every year we are becoming more and more saturated with our surroundings and in time we may be able to adapt ourselves to our civilization and crystalize into a people severely practical, giving us better health, longer life, greater immunity from danger, the adoption of a more general rule in morals, religion and social life, and live as rational beings ought to live.


