Unless Govern ment bonds are to be constantly issued and sold to replenish our exhausted gold, only to be again exhausted, it is apparent that the operation of the silver pur chase law now in force, leads in the direction of the entire substitution of silver for the gold in the Government Treasury, and that this must be followed by the payment of all Government obli-

ations in depreciated silver. At this stage gold and silver must part ompany and the goverment must fail in ts established policy to maintain the two metals on a parity with each other. If, as many of its friends claim, silver ought to occupy a large place in our currency and the currency of the world hrough general international co-operaion and agreement, it is obvious that the United States will not be in a position o gain a hearing in favor of such an arrangement so long as we are willing to continue our attempt to accomplish the result single-handed.

INFERIOR MONEY. The knowledge in business circles among our own people that our Government cannot make its first equivalent to intrinsic value, nor keep inferior money on a parity with superior money by its own independent efforts, has resulted in such a lack of confidence at home, in the stability of currency values that capital refuses its aid to new enterprises while millions are actually withdrawn from the channels of trade and commerce to become idle and unproductive in the hands of timid owners. Foreign investors equally alert not only decline to purchase American securities, but make haste to sacrifice those which they already have.

It does not meet the situation to say that apprehension in regard to the future of our finances is groundless and that there is no reason for lack of confidence in the purposes or power of the government in the premises. The very existence of this apprehension and lack of confidence, however caused, is a menace which ought not for a moment to be disregarded. Possibly, if the undertaking we have in hand were the maintenance of a specific known quantity of silver as a parity with gold our ability to do so might be estimated and guaged and perhaps, in view of our unparalleled growth and resources, might be favorably passed apon. But when our avowed endeavor is to maintain such parity in regard to an amount of silver increasing at the rate of \$50,000,000 yearly, with no fixed termination to such increase, it can hardly be said that a problem is presented ly be said that a problem is presented whose solution is free from doubt.
