Why Pork is High in Price. Only twice in twenty years have the prices for hog products reached the present level, and since the war every such advance has come one or two years after short corn crops, and has been due directly to deficient harvests. much below the average, and such crops have heretofore been immediately followed by a free marketing of swine, which the owners thought it unprofitable, in view of the high price of corn, to feed longer or to keep for breeding purposes; but in the present case the usuai procedure has been reversed, as a short corn crop has not been followed by increased but by diminished offerings, the winter's packing having been only about three-fifths the number packed in the preceding year.

Present conditions, affecting the supply of the raw material entering into bacon, ham and lard, are evidently unusual and due to some cause relating further back and more permanent than a deficient corn harvest, which otherwise would, as heretofore, have had the immediate effect of enlarging the supply by prompting the marketing of an undue proportion of young as well as breeding animals, to be ultimately followed by such a reduction of stocks as necessarily results from drying the current at its source. Such results followed the deicient corn harvests in 1874 and 1881. and, in a lesser degree, the short crop of 1890. The present high range of prices, cannot, however, be attributed to any such cause, as the acreage yield of corn in 1891 was exceptionally high and the deficient supply of swine was developed while this great crop was fed and before the result of the corn harvest of 1893 could be known.

The cause producing the present shortage are unusual in the United States, wholly different from these heretofere producing high prices, and go to the very root of production; and there seems little probability of this period of high prices being followed by one o low prices. On the contrary, presen conditions are neither temporary nor and vet had the effrontery to stamp up- such as are likely to end, as heretofore on the American dollar, "In God We in prices below a remanerative level even if the acreage yield of corn shall be for several years at the maximum. The determining factor in the supply of swine for a population increasing as

is that of the United States is the relaive abundance or scarcity of feeding naterial, which is here almost exclusively corn, and the supply of this material cannot keep pace with population inless an immense new acreage is yearly brought under cultivation and new pig growers added, in like ratio, to the productive forces. Without new acres of corn there will be few or no new pig growers and little addition to the supply of pigs, while the pig-conprogressively greater yearly ratio. During the last eight years pig production in the United States has, practically been at a standstill, while consumption has increased at a progressively augmenting aggregate.

Colossal Icebergs in the South Atlantic. Captain Hay, of the British ship, Persian Empire, which recently completed a voyage from Tacoma around Cape Horn to England, reports to the llydrograbic Office that he encountered, on March 27 last, an unusually large amount of ice in latitude 50 degrees south, longi-40 degrees west. There were thirtythree large iceburgs near the ship, some of them three hundred and fifty feet high, while the lookout from aloft reported the sea to be one mass of icebergs and loose ice. On immense icefloe, which was only about thirty feet above the sea level, was estimated to be sixteen miles square.

For several months similar reports of exceptional massive and numerous iceburgs in the South Atlantic have been made by vessels rounding Cape Horn. It would be interesting to discover exactly what has caused the South Polar regions to discharge so much of their ice and to ship it northward by means of the Antarctic currents into milder latitudes. Possibly this extraordinay phenomenon can be ultimately traced to an excess of solar radiation during a period, like the present, of excessive solar activity. The northern limit of the Antarctic icedrift the South Atlantic occasionally reaches almost up to the fortieth parallel of south latitude, between the twentieth and twenty-fifth meridians west. Fortunately the immense icebergs seen by Captain Hay have not drifted so far

DROCLAMATION BY THE

STATE OF MARYLAND, EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

WHEREAS, Section one of Article fourteen of the Constitution of Maryland makes it the duty of the Governor to order the publication in certain newspapers to be designated by him, of any bill, or bill; , passed propesing any mendments to the said Co. s itution; and WHEREAS, at the January Session, 1822, of the General Assembly of Maryland, a bill was passed proposing an amendment to the Constitution, which amendment is Chapter 313 of the Acts of 1892, and is as follows, to wit: CHAPTER 313.

AN ACT to add an additional section to Article four of the Constitution of this

State. SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, Three-fifths of all the nembers of the two houses concurring, that the following section be, and the same is hereby proposed, as an amendment to the Constitution of this State; and if adopted by the legal and qualified voters thereof, as herein, provided the same shall supercede and stand in the place of Section thirty-nine of Article four of said Constitution. Sec. 39. The General Assembly shall, as often as it may think the same proper and

expedient, provide by law for the election of n additional Judge of the Supreme Bench of Baltimore city, and whenever provision is so made by the General Assembly, there shall be elected by the voters of said city another Judge of the Supreme Bench of Battimore city, who shall be subject to the same const: tutional provisions, hold his office for the same term of years, receive the same compensation, and have the same powers as are, or shall be provided by the Constitution, or laws of this State, for the Judges of said Supreme Bench of Baltimore city, and the General Assembly may provide by laws, or the Supreme Bench by its rules, for requiring causes in any of the courts of Baltimore city to be tried before the Court without a jury unless the litigants or some one of them shal within such reasonable time or times, as may be prescribed, elect to have their causes tried pefore a jury. And the General Assembly may reapportion, change or enlarge the jurisdiction of the several courts in said city.

SEC, 2. And be it further enacted, by the authority aforesaid, That the foregoing section hereby proposed as an amendment to the Constitution shall be, at the next general election to be held in this State, submitted to the legal and qualified voters thereof for their adoption or rejection in pursuance of the direction contained in Article fourteen of the Constitution of this State; and at the said general election the vote on said proposed amendment to the Constitution shall be by ballot, and upon each ballot there shall b written or printed the words "For the Consti tutional Amendment" or "Against the Constitutional Amendment," as the voter may elect, and immediately after said election due return shall be made to the Governor of the votes for and against said proposed amendment, as directed by said fourteenth Article

Now, therefore, I, Frank Brown, Governor of Maryland do hereby order and direct that the said hereinbefore described bill, or Act of the General Assembly, proposing an amend-ment to the Constitution of Maryland, be published once a week for at least three months in two newspapers published in each county in this State, if so many are therein published, and in three newspapers in the city or Baltimore, before the next ensuing general election, which will be held on Tuesday, the seventh day of November, 1893; at which said election the proposed amendment aforesaid
