THE BRITISH NAVY.—In the House of Commons Monday the navy estimates for 1893-4 were discussed. He declared that unless a determined effort was made to construct new warships England's supremacy on the sea would be lost. He said that the French and Russian battle-ships together reached a total of 25, against 22 effective British vessels of the same class. France and Russia have ten battleships in course of construction, while Great Britain has only three. In first-class cruisers only was Great Britain slightly superior to France and Russia. He suggested that supplementary estimates be allowed for the purpose of pushing on the work of building new war-ships.
