Living on One Dollar a Week, A few weeks ago Mr. Edward Atkinson, the well-known economist, made the assertion that "complete nutrition, consisting of meat, grain and vegetables, can be purchased at retail prices in that would be necessary to a workingman. The food was to be prepared on a stove which Mr. Atkinson invented, and

which is simple of construction, its entire cost being only two dollars, Mr. Atkinson not deriving any royalty from it, as he has given it to the public. The claims of this careful and conservative man, of course, attracted the people's attention. Wastefulness is the great evil of American life, and if saving can be introduced, the gain would be of inestimable value. Nowadays, the newspapers test and investigate everything, and it is not surprising to find that a reporter of the Boston Herald took this matter in self, and his bills of fare included during that time these articles: Beef, lamb, baked beans, salt pork, white potatoes, sweet potatoes, onions, beets, turnips, Quaker oats, macaroni, cranberry sauce, apple sauce, bread, butter, coffee, sugar and grapes, with pepper, salt and mixed pickles. The total cost of the food for the week was almost seventy-eight cents; of fuel, ten cents, of salt, pepper and pickles, two cents; total ninety nine cents and nine mills, or within one mill of a dollar bill.
