Living on One Dollar a Week.
A few weeks ago Mr. Edward Atkin-
son, the well-known economist, made
the assertion that "complete nutrition,
consisting of meat, grain and vegetables,
can be purchased at retail prices in Bos-
ton at the present time at a cost of
not over ten cents a day, or seventy
cents a week." This nutrition was all
that would be necessary to a working-
man. The food was to be prepared on a
stove which Mr. Atkinson invented, and
which is simple of construction, its en-
tire cost being only two dollars. Mr.
Atkinson not deriving any royalty from
the sale of his stove, and his conserva-
tive claims of this careful and conservative
man of course attracted the people's at-
tention. Wastefulness is the great evil
of American life, and if saving can be in-
troduced, the gain would be of estima-
ble value. Nowadays, the newspapers
test and investigate everything, and it is
not surprising to find that a reporter of
the Boston Herald took this matter in
charge. He tried the experiment. He
lived seven days on food which cost him
sixty cents, and his bill of fare included during
that time these articles: Beef, lamb,
baked beans, salt pork, white potatoes,
sweet potatoes, onions, beans, turnips,
Quaker oats, macaroni, cranberry sauce,
apple sauce, bread, butter, coffee, sugar
and grapes, with pepper, salt and mixed
pickles. The total cost of the food for
the week was almost seventy-eight cents,
or ten cents of salt, pepper and
pickles. Two cents, total ninety-nine
cents and nine mills, or within one mill
of a dollar bill. The results upon his
stomach were told in his own words:
"On weighing myself Saturday morning
on the same scales and in the same
clothes as on the preceding evening, I
found myself 154 pounds 8 ounces.
This was on an empty stomach. It was
a loss of 21 pounds for the week. It was
a surprising day, and there was no
mysterious moisture in my clothes. A
good dinner would, doubtless, have
brought my weight up to the normal
standard."
The value of the experiment is the
proof that living on one dollar a week is
a possibility. The reporter did his usual
newspaper work during the seven days,
and he declares that he was never
weakened or fatigued. Perhaps we are ap-
proaching the time when economy will
be a pleasure and cooking a delight, and
when heavy grocery bills will not inter-
fere with growing bank accounts.

THE
Population of the World.
The human family living on the earth
to-day consists of about 1,450,000,000
souls—not fewer, probably more. These
are distributed literally all over the
earth's surface, there being no consider-
able spot on the globe where man has
not found a foothold. In Asia, the so-
called "cradle of the human race," there
are now about 800,000,000 people, dense-
ly crowded, on an average of 110 to every
square mile. In Europe there are 230,
000,000, averaging 100 to the square
mile, not so crowded as Asia, but every-
where dense, and in many places over-
population. In Africa there are ap-
proximately 210,000,000 and in the
Americas—North, South and Central—
110,000,000, these latter, of course, rela-
tively thinly scattered over broad areas.
On the islands, large and small, there are
probably 10,000,000 more. The extremes
of the blacks and the whites are as five
to three, the remaining 500,000,000 in-
clude the brown, yellow and tawny in-
color. Of the entire race 500,000,000 are
well clothed—that is, they wear garments
of some kind that will cover modestness
—250,000,000 habitually go naked, and
700,000,000 only cover the middle parts
of the body; 500,000,000 live in houses,
700,000,000 in huts and caves, the re-
maining 250,000,000 virtually having no
place to lay their heads.

Squirrels Destroying Birds' Eggs.
The number of song birds that breed
man, as it is often said, do not frequent
human habitations for man's sake at all.
They are only anxious to get near man-
kind because near man they are free
from the destruction by wild squirrels
which are always there and which are
enemies in the woods and destroy large
numbers of birds' eggs. But the cat near
the abode of man is almost equally a
destroyer of young birds.—Boston Cultivator.

Strength of the Human Voice.
An interesting incident showing at
how great a distance a conversation can
be carried on is related by Lieutenant
Foster of the third Parry arctic expedi-
tion, in which he says that he conversed
with a man across the harbor of Port
Bowen, a mile and a quarter away, and
it has also been asserted on good author-
ity that at Gibraltar the human voice has
been distinctly heard at a distance of ten
miles.
