LET THERE BE NO LET UP. Although it is but two weeks to the election from Tuesday next there has not been much of a canvass in Howard county by either party. 

JUDGE COOLET'S PLAIN WORDS. Constitutional Dutles of the Senate and Its Presiding Officer.

In reply to an inquiry as to what course he thinks the majority of the Senate and the pursuit of happiness." We are ought to pursue in order to secure a vote on the repeal bill, ex-Judge T. M. Cooley has written the following: "The Senate is one house of a legislature created by the Constitution to make laws for the country. Its authority to act is by majority; this is clearly implied, and as much a part of the constitutional grant of power as if expressly declared. If the Senate were to make a rule declaring that the minority might, by talk for the express purpose and by dilatory motion having no other object, or in any other way stop legislation and prevent the majority proceeding to a vote, the rule be void, because depriving the Senate of its constitutional power. It a custom to that effect were to grow up and be tolerated by courtesy as one that in so dignified a body could not be abused, it would be equally void, and the Senate, in recognizing it to the extent of permitting the minority to decide what should be had, when the minority so de clared, would be taking a revolutionary

"Its constitutional duty plainly is to proceed as if no such revolutionary rule or custom existed. When a minority of the members show by their conduct, and even boastingly declare that they propose to avail thereof for the express purpose of preventing the Senate exercising its constitutional authority, they are, in so doing, professedly making use of the rules of the body for a disorderly purpose, and the Senate is no more bound to change in the character of the people submit to their disorderly proceedings than it would be to that of persons not

o prevent regular and legal legislation. Members of the majority should make the proper motions looking to definite was thought she could not live. and final action on the pending measure, and the presiding officer should recognize them; since in that way can the inalienable right of the Senate to press its will be exercised. If this is not done, upon an assumption that in some manner, by the action or non-action of the Senate, it has become impossible unless the minorty assents, then the leading principle in representative government is in one house of Congress abrogated. To consent to the doctrine surrendered this power to a minority of its members is in effect to declare that without any authority conferred upon it to limit or alter the full grant of legislative power conferred upon it by the Constitution the Senate has nevertheless done so, not from any necessity, or even on a supposition that public benefits were to result, but from the extraordinary assumption that legislative courtesy will not beabused when persistently the abuse is going on in the presence of the Senate itself and is being boasted of and gloried

"It is enough that the Senate cannot limit, directly or indirectly, its constitutional powers. It should proceed to exercise them, and to that end should disconstitutional grant, to bring the legislative authority of the country into con-

STATE OF MARYLAND, EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT. WHEREAS, Section one of Article fourteen of the Constitution of Maryland makes it the duty of the Governor to order the publication n certain newspapers to be designated by mendments to the said Constitution; and he General Assembly of Maryland, a bill was passed proposing an amendment to the Constitution, which amendment is Chapter 313 of

the Acts of 1892, and is as follows, to wit: CHAPTER 313. AN ACT to add an additional section t Article four of the Constitution of this

State. SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, Three-fifths of all the nembers of the two houses concurring, that the following section be, and the same is hereby proposed, as an amendment to the Consti tution of this State; and if adopted by the legal and qualified voters thereof, as herein provided the same shall supercede and stand in the place of Section thirty-nine of Article four of said Constitution.

SEC. 39. The General Assembly shall, a often as it may think the same proper and expedient, provide by law for the election of an additional Judge of the Supreme Bench of Baltimore city, and whenever provis on is so made by the General Assembly, there shall be elected by the voters of said city another Judge of the Supreme Bench of Battimore city, who shall be subject to the same const: tutional provisions, hold his office for th same term of years, receive the same comper sation, and have the same powers as are, or shall be provided by the Constitution, or laws of this State, for the Judges of said Supreme Bench of Baltimore city, and the Genera Assembly may provide by laws, or the Supreme Beach by its rules, for requiring causes in any of the courts of Baltimore city to be tried before the Court without a jury. within such reasonable time or times, as ma be prescribed, elect to have their causes trice before a jury. And the General Assembl may reapportion, change or enlarge the jurisdiction of the several courts in said city.
