The message of President Cleveland which was delivered to Congress on Monday is voluminous in detail treating every subject which may be considered a part of our national polity in a brief but comprehensive manner. That it is an able document and exhibits the mind and longer exists. purpose of a careful and conservative statesman goes without saying. Our existing relations with foreign countries is fully discussed and little if any of the field which it is his duty to survey is left untouched. Of the recent silver agitation he says:

"The recent repeal of the provision of law requiring the purchase of silver bullion by the government as a feature of our monotary scheme, has made an entire change in the complexion of our currency affairs. I do not doubt that the ultimate result of this action will be most salutary and far-reaching. In the nature of things, however, it is impossible to know at this time precisely what conditions will be brought about by the change, or what, if any, supplementary legislation may, in the light of such conditions, appear to be essential or expedient. Of course, after the recent financial perturbation, time is necessary for the re-establishment of business confidence. When, however, through this restored confidence the money which has been frightened into hoarding places is returned to trade and enterprise, a survey of the situation will probably disclose a safe path leading to a permanently sound currency, abundantly sufficient to tariff, and that it will be general pros meet every requirment of our increasing perity, not the presperity of favored population and business.

"in the pursuit of this object we should resolutely turn away from alluring and temporary expedients, determined to be content with nothing less than a lasting and comprehensive financial plan. 
