AMEND IT OR DEFEAT IT. Senator John Walter Smith has a last introduced his free school book bill. It appropriates \$125,060 to be apportioned among the counties and to the city of Baltimore to purchase free books for scholars of the public schools.

The bill is not asked by the school authorities of the State. It is certainly not asked by the taxpayers. It is a piece of political buncombe springing from the Eastern Shore and used to get votes in certain trans-Chesapeake quarters by local politicians last fall. It will mean a keeping up of the State tax-rate when a decrease is in sight.

Under the bill the amount apportioned to Howard county would be perhaps \$3,000 annually. This sum for legitimate school work would be a God send. It would help to clear out our log and oldfield school-houses. It would assist the school-board to pay the county teachers decent salaries. If the bill is amended to provide this annual increase to the school fund, THE TIMES will support it, heart and soul, for the school tax is the best tax laid. But its diversion at the present time to the supplying of free books, to those who are able to pay for them, is almost a crime.

The school-board aiready supplies books free to all who are unable to pay. No tuition fees of any kind are imposed in this county and instruction is literally as free as air and water. Under the present system books are purchased for the older children of a family, then pass to the younger, and the cost per capita is not so much as a dollar a year. Surely those who are able to pay this ought not to object and those who are unable are not required to pay.

The sum proposed by the Smith bill will not be more than half enough to pay for free books. The contemplated law would encourage carelessness and abuse of books. It would forbid schoolboards on financial grounds from making changes of books as often as is desirable to secure best educational results according to modern standards.

Let the Smith bill be amended leaving it discretionary with school-boards whether the money appropriated shall g to the purchase of free books, or to general school purposes. If not so amended in the name of the public welfare, in the name of the public schools, in the name of the taxpayers of Maryland, we call upon the legislature to defeat the meas-

DELEGATE WOLFE'S BILL.

It is stated that Howard county farmers may ask Delegate Wolfe to make some modifications in his hay-scales bill, mentioned heretofore in THE TIMES' Aunapolis news, to obviate double payment for weighing, first to the local weigher, and again to the State weigh-master. Mr. Wolfe may likewise be requested to insert a clause remedying the feared inconvenience of going to the State scales to pay the State fee when weighing has been done elsewhere. There has been some talk latterly in

favor of removing the Western scales as far in this direction as the limits of Baltimore city. The original intent was that the scales should be upon the edge of the city, and they became so far within the limits only when the "Belt" was

Mr. Wolfe's original plan of establishing a branch scales has also been again favorably discussed.

We are sorry to see the Baltimore Sun, by which so many country people have sworn in the past, developing symptoms of opposition to any assessment of property at ail. In this the Sun is certainly placing itself entirely out of line with the Democratic party, which has promised the people reassessment, because they have demanded it. If the demand is wrong, the people are to blame. If the demand is not complied with, the Democratic party is to blame. The people will make mistakes, but that is one of the incidents of a democratic form of government. And in spite of temporary mistakes, we believe that in the main the people will be found eventually right. But right or not, they are going to have their way, and what are we going to do about it?


