J. B. Morrow, - - Business Manager HE CAREFUL WHAT YOU BO DO. What is going to be done about as assessment? That is the conundrum of

Ten days ago the question was thought settled by the compromise resulting in the amended Hayes bill. The objections to the measure were simply as expected. Yet diligence was being exercised to meet any which had color of reason and it seemed possible to estimate the forces in opposition to the

Attempts upon its life in the house of its loud-professing friends were not suspected. Yet from this source, thus far, has emanated the bill's most serious

The menace has come in the shape of a rider providing the taxation of mort-

This is not the time and place to take up the discussion of mortgage taxation. Suffice it to say that the friends of reassessment are not agreed upon the new question which has been sprung. Therefore, as Senator Haves suggests, let the taxation of mortgages come up in a separate measure. Let it not be used to endanger the pending bill and the cause of

The plea has been all along for a simplification of issues. That was Governor Brown's underlying idea when the Field bill was introduced prior to the subsequent State-famed compromise. We cling to that idea. Enact that upon which the people are agreed and let debatable points be an after considera-

Senator Hayes has exposed the subterfuge of tacking to the assessment bill, with much show of zeal for its welfare, an amendment which is intended to ensure defeat. Senators Newman, Bennett and Moss may be sincere in their desire for reassessment. But their actions are throwing suspicion upon them. If they are really opposed to the Hayes bill, it would be more creditable to them, and likewise pay them better in the end, to come out in the open and fight.

We shall be glad to see mortgage taxation fully ventilated. The people can not be too thoroughly posted on such questions as the sum of \$10,000 property and \$5,000 debt, the relative responsibilities of legal and equitable owners and a thousand nice little arithmetical propositions involved. But it is better at first to do too little than to vainly attempt too much.

One step in the right direction may eventually carry a cause on to triumph. One step too far may retard it almost indefinitely.

Of course we grant that the uncertainty at present prevailing is distressing. It is painful, for instance, to see a great leader of thought, like the Baltimore Sun, first arguing for reassessment and next against it, now favoring a constitutional convention and next opposing it like the Flying Dutchman leaving its readers upon a vast sea of uncertainty as to what it thinks, what it thinks i thinks, or what it thinks it wants then to think. But it is a condition, not theory, which confronts us. Hence our safe suggestion to do what we can do, be careful what we do do, and not to do what we can not do and hoodoo the whole business.

THE LATE CHARLES J. M. GWINN. In the death of Charles J. M. Gwinn the State of Maryland has lost one of its most distinguished and honored sons and the Democratic party one of its best counsellors. It may be long ere we shall see his like again. Such men are too few in this world, hence it is that they can never but be ill spared.

Mr. Gwinn was not a seeker of public preferment yet was repeatedly honored by his party and State, his most im portant position having been that of Attorney General, held for two terms.

It has been truly said his tastes were distinctly academic and aesthetic. Had his ambition been for public distinction. there are few positions of national importance he would not have adorned. But his aim was to influence others by force of his attainments and natural endowneats. How he did this is shown by the fact that his counsels as an attorney were sought by the leading citizens of Maryland, shaped the policies of great corporations, contributed to the standing of the Johns Hopkins University, and were demanded by his party in the drafting of more than one national

We believe the Senate finance con mittee has charge just now of th Smith free school-book bill. If the com mittee seriously thinks of reporting the bill at all, it should be in such amended form as to make the appropriation, unschool purposes in the discretion of school commissioners.

WATER WORKS FOR ELLICOTT CITY. Nature has done her part in affording Ellicott City a good water supply. Sucker Branch, a copious stream, is but a short distance to the north while the Tiber flows through the town. From the sources of the latter springs an abundance of pure water. The people of this community are profoundly impressed with the fact that a fire once well under way would sweep everything before it.

Another point to be considered is that for Ellicott City to avail herself of the water supply nature has given, by the establishment of an efficient service for iousehold as well as protective proposes, would be a long step toward making this, for residential purposes, one of the most attractive of Maryland's suburban

THE ASSESSMENT BILL.

Messes. Editors of The Times:-Unless taxpayers are benefited by a new assessment law, why pay some two or three hundred thousand doitars for that which is of no benefit? And the question very properly arises, What are the benefits to be derived by the new assessment? Our Farmers' Grange, Alliances, and others, have passed resolutions in favor of an assessment bill, to contain no exemptions whatever; yet we see in the bill before our legislative bodies, the clause exempting millions of dollars; so taxpayers gain nothing in this re-

Then, instead of making corporations pay the taxes on their issues of stocks and bonds, they are to be taxed in the hands of the holders. Why relieve a corporation that issues stocks and bonds largely in excess of the value of the property, and saddle the taxes on the holders? Do taxpayers gain anything by this? It is oppressing in many nstances, the widow and orbhan, who hold, say a four or five per cent bond, and have to pay one to two per cent. for their investment. So we might go and show that the counties in our State will gain absolutely nothing by the pas-

sage of this bill. We admit there has been a clamor for new assessment bill, but when we see that neither the taxpayer nor the State is benefited, all taxpayers should discard it. They are certainly not obliged to

accept a bill, that in their judgment benefits no one, and no bill should be rushed through without giving our people time to examine its provisions. And we ask, are the finances of the State and the rights of our citizens to be entrusted to carrying out the ideas of one man-as this bill seems to be,-and are we obliged to accept his views without question? All independent citizens and voters should look well into this matter and not be obliged to accept a oill without their approval, although hey have asked for a new assessment

We quote from a correspondent in the Baltimore Sun of Friday last: "The law loes not come up to the requirements of those in favor or no exemptions, because of the extensive exemption clause, and on the other hand, the inquisitorial feature of the bill exceeds the bounds of propriety and decency, which will keep capital and business men from doing businsss, and settling in our state, and, on the whole, if this bill is passed and becomes the law, it will be a great misfortune, and, we may say, a public calamity and permanent injury to the prosperity of our State. It looks as though the authors of this bill had no experi ence in finance, nor just views in regard to the same. They certainly can own nothing, and their object seems to be to oppress those who have accumulated little, with their unjust legislation. The bill as a whole is an outrage on al business, and unjust towards all tax-payers. We think the clamor is fast giving way, in view of the unreasonable and unjust features of the bill now before

our legislative bodies." So if the bill becomes a law there should be a clause inserted, referring it to the vote of our people for acceptance or rejection, at our next election, and not imposed upon us without our consent. HOWARD COUNTY TAXPAYER.


