MR, GORMAN'S TIMELY SPEECH. Senator Gorman's timely speech in the United States Senate Monday is given in full by THE TIMES and is well worthy of careful perusal.

It gives distinct notice to a malicious set, who are seeking to embarrass the Senate, and Senator Gorman in particular, that their motives are understood and their efforts shall receive only the attention they merit.

There is no respectable person or agency in Maryland that can dare to cast aspersion upon the course or motives of Senator Gorman in regard to the tariff bill now before the Senate. The same old crowd, with such changes as time brings through the withering of old branches and the springing up of new sprouts, is engaged in the reprehensible work, but intelligent Democrats understand them. They work the same old game. They masquerade in the garb of Democracy, but they are really worse than Republicans. Professing great zeal for the Wilson bill, they tried to get the legislature to practically vote a lack of confidence in Senators Gorman and Gibson. Failing in this they circulate petitions to the same effect, and in some instances, we regret to observe, obtain the signatures of thoughtless Democrats. Finding that their resolutions and petitions will not avail, they then assume the role of the bully, and insolently set their bunco standards to measure the Democracy of men who have saved the Democratic party's life as often as the renegade crew referred to have attempted to take it.

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
