HARD TIMES A BLESSING.

It maybe that the era of hard times the people of the United States have been passing through will not prove an unmitigated curse. In the wake of war there has ever been demoralization, and not the least of the evils which have followed in the train is the disposition to get money and expend it extravagantly. Sordidness and disregard for the wants of his fellow man, to the humanitarian, has become a discouraging characteristic of the average moneymaker of our country. We use this term for the reason the majority of humanity seem to be imbued with the Idea that money making is the chief-end of man; that a man without this qualification is not worth mentioning, is either a laggard or a sentimental weakling, unworthy to be classed with those who have succeeded in amassing fortunes, no matter how they got them.

All this seems to have had a temporary check. There is hardly an individual any where in the country who has not been compelled to draw in expenses. The millionaires of our large cities are confronted with the unpleasant situation that half their securities are not paying a cent, and their lavish expenditure of mony has to be considerably curtailed. Every business house and manufacturing firm has been devising means to reduce expenses. Railroads everywhere have lopped off trains and the public is The middle class is struggling almost in vain to make ends meet and as for the laboring man with him it has been from hand to mouth, with millions retiring at night not knowing whether the mor row will furnish them sustenance. The majority of farmers out of debt are living, barely living, while those in debt have no assurance they will ever be free from the burden.

Consequently from necessity the people must be learning habits of frugality, and many who thought themselves fortified against financial shortage have discovered that even the best secured in comes in periods like the present are not to be relied upon, and are taking a more serious view of life than they did. There is no doubt that this habit of reinforcing resources coupled with daily self-denials, enforced though they may be, will have a salutary effect upon the people and when returning good times appear will be in better trim to guard against future asperities of life than they ever were before.

There is hardly man living who is not painfully aware of the situation. We are uttering a truth when we say that the hard times are the result of the late war-the demoralization which ensued: money-making, extravagance, plutocratic reign, the operation of a political policy bad for the masses, resulting from an utter disregard for duty among those who have assumed to be our rulers rather than the servants of the people.

The latest vagary incident to crankism has been started by one Coxe in the west. He has conceived the idea of marching on Washington with an army of 100,000 men for the purpose ostensibly of influencing national legislation in the direction of certain reforms. Wretched nucleuses of the army have been formed at different points, principally in Ohio, and thus far his "army" has not risen much beyond the dignity of a corporal's guard. On several occasions he has had under his command a hundred or more haggard, shivering men who have been fed by the people of the towns through which they have passed. Not since the time when the Millerites, clothed in white garments, stood waiting to be translated, body and sleeves has a more idiousyncratic movement been inaugurated. A little more of this kind of thing and many will be led to believe that crankism is a concomtant of civilization.





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
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
