### Gold Separation.

What is claimed to be the most advan-  
taged process for the separation of fine  
gold in places comes from Montana. It  
is a dry process, designed especially for  
localities distant from sufficient water  
for other methods, the ore or gravel be-  
ing run through a crusher or steam dry-  
ing, after which it is dumped into the  
hopper of the separator. Dropping from  
this, it strikes a powerful blast of air,  
which carries it between two sets of  
slowly revolving copper cylinders coated  
with one-sixteenth of an inch of mer-  
cury.

These cylinders are placed in two lines  
of three each, one above the other, so  
that the dust, driven by the air blast,  
passes between them in a wavelike line.  
The ore first strikes a cylinder similar  
to the others, but revolving in an oppo-  
site direction, which catches the coarser  
gold and the nuggets. Then, passing  
between the other cylinders, all the gold  
is caught, however fine, and the waste  
is carried by the air blast to a conveyor,  
which bears it away. The mercury on  
the cylinders is constantly renewed, so  
that a fresh surface is always presented,  
and it is asserted that the process has  
been subjected to such various tests,  
and so successfully, as to demonstrate  
its peculiar adaptability to the class of  
work in question. —New York Sun.

### All Snakes Do Not Hiss.

The popular idea that all snakes hiss  
is incorrect when anacandras are in ques-  
tion, if we may believe a close observer  
of the serpent family. The sound they  
make is more like a growl than a hiss  
and has been well described by a travel-  
ler as a "low, roaring noise." Their pow-  
ers of deglutition are sufficiently won-  
derful to make exaggeration unneces-  
sary, credible witnesses testifying to the  
fact that one has been known to swal-  
low a horse, while bullocks are not in-  
frequently attacked also. Few nonsensic-  
al titles readers, by the way, are aware that  
not only do the jaw hinges of the boa  
tribe become dilated in the act of  
swallowing a large animal, subsequently  
resuming their proper position by means  
of the elastic connecting tendons, but  
that the skull bones separate centrally,  
so the whole constitutes a sort of quad-  
rangular orifice with apparently indefi-  
nite powers of expansion. —Detroit Free  
Press.

### A Luxury of the Rich.

to bed in a quiet room and fed for weeks  
on enormous quantities of milk. He  
must take exercise, however, and this he  
does by proxy through the device of  
massage. He must do absolutely nothing
