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MILLS SUGGESTED A SUGAR TARIFF. Little by little the whole truth as to the sugar schedule and the details of the tariff bill is coming out, proving the Baltimore Sun to be not only mendacious and malicious but likewise astute.

WALSH ON THE SITUATION. Hon. Patrick Walsh, of Georgia, in his great speech on the floor of the United States Senate, said truly that the pending tariff bill "is not all that its framers designed. It is not all that the Democratic party desires, but it is a substantial compliance with Democratic professions. It is in the line of tariff reform.
