Representative McMillin, a radical ariff reformer on Monday said Whilst the House bill is a better measare, in my judgment, than the Senate, this measure which will become a law instead by today's action is a wonderful improvement on the McKinley law. It gives free wool, free lumber, free hemp, flax and jute and reduces largely the manufactured goods into which all these materials enter. To illustrate, the average duty on woolen goods under the McKinley law is 981 per cent. This has been reduced more than half. There is a considerable reduction in all the schedules and the average on all will be about 38 per cent., as against about 50 per cent. under the present law, and in addition to this are the very greatest additions to the free list upon which no tax is collected at all." Mr. Wilson in the course of his speech

in the House Monday said: "But whatever the measure of shortcomings of this (the Senate) bill in its present form, whatever be its demerits in mere schedules, this I do know, that it is better than the McKinley bill. * * * Take the sugar schedule, vicious as it may be, favorable to the trust as it may be, it is less vicious, less favorable to the trust, less burdensome to the people than is the McKinley law. * * * I have no hesitation is saying that when the schedules of the Senate bill get into normal operation it will produce sufficient, and more than sufficient, revenue for the support of the Government,





Killing Rats By Electricity. A Philadelphia electrician has goné "one better" on Edison's familiar cockroachkilling device. The proprietor of a downtown restaurant in the Quaker City was constantly pestered by a host of rats, which swarmed at all hours into his yard in search of the toothsome offal' temporarily stored there. The favorite route of the rotients was a sewer inlet at the back of the yard, which terminated in a hole alongside a grated covering. The electrician one day caught sight of the intruders, and forthwith set to work to try an interesting experiment. Laying coils of copper wire about the hole he made an attachment to the electric light wires within the building, and fixed in a convenient place a key for turningon the current. 


