#### SERVING KOSSUTH.

AN AMERICAN YOUTH WHO VOLUN TEERED IN HUNGARY'S CAUSE.

He Was Sent to Rescue the Crown Jewels. Carried Cipher Dispatches Which He Threw Away Because He Was Frightened-Not a Good Conspirator.

It has remained for one American, Mr. W. J. Stillman, the art critic, to relate the strangest story of Kossuth's plans and plots, both in this country and in his own unhappy land, that has anywhere appeared. In The Century Mr. Stillman describes a mission on which he was sent by Kossuth after he had volunteered in his service. "I followed him to London and established myself in a dark quarter, where spies would be little likely to notice me, and reported to him through Pulszky, whose address I had. It was finally determined that I should undertake an expedition to Hungary. The object, I was told, was the rescue of the Hungarian crown jewels, hidden at some point down the Danube before the flight of the dictator and his ministry into Turkey. 1 was to visit Vienna on the way, and Kossuth gave me the names of three persons In that city with whom I might communicate, requesting that the one who seemed to mo the most apt for the purpose should go to London and put himself in

communication with Kossuth. "To steady my nerves in Vienna Kossuth had told me of a conspirator who had been arrested on suspicion, his name having been found among many others in the memorandum book of an emissary whe had been arrested for tampering with the troops. All persons whose names were found in the book were arrested. This particular person, having really a most important position in the conspiracy and not knowing why he was arrested, naturally believed that he had been betrayed, and to avoid being driven to disclosures under torture adopted the only means of fered him of committing suicide by wrapping his bedelothes around him and set ting fire to them, his bed and his light be-

ing his only furniture. When he had been burned so that he could not survive, he tore off the clothes, and calling the guard told him to summon the council, and when they had assembled in his cell told them that he was a conspirator, but his secrets were beyond their power of extortion—and died. This gave me a keen sense of the necessity of caution, and as I was certain to be put under surveillance as soon as the police knew I was in Vienna I took time by the forelock, and before the police paper had been sent in took a cab, drove to within a block of the house of the person I was te see first, dismissed the cab and made my visit, establishing communications and precautions against the police. But my consternation may be imagined when my fellow conspirator, after all our arrange ments were complete, took me into the room where his family were assembled and introduced me as a friend who came from Kossuth. With five women from 12 to 40 years old in possession of my secret the tranquillity of my stay in Vienna was far from complete, but it was a family of red republicans, and I was safe.

"I waited nearly a month, and seeing that the police began to wonder what I had to occupy myself with I took to my bed and sent for a doctor. This was Or-zovensky, who had been chief of the medfeal staff of Kossuth's army and with whom I made friends. But still I got no news from Kossuth or his correspondent in Pest, and as the position could not be confidant of the doctor, told him my business and asked him if I could leave the dispatches with him while I went back to London to put matters on another footing Not for the world, he replied, would be mix himself in the affair, and he added that if it were discovered that he had had knowledge of my business he would be arrested and would be a ruined man for not

having betrayed me to the police.

"Then for the first time I lost my nerve, and my mouth was in an instant as dry as a bone, my tongue resembling a dry stick. I was never so frightened before or since, but I kept self possession enough to note the singularity of the phenomeno: and made up my mind on the spot to get out of the range of the doctor's reve-Intions as soon as possible. As nearly as I can remember I did not stop to sleep in a bed till I reached Frankfort, and I got back to London by the earliest conveyance and went to report to Kossuth. He received my report with perfect equanimity and asked me only what I had done with the dispatches. In my panie I had thrown them into the drain as the only place where they were in no danger of being sought for if I were arrested before getting out of the country, and this I told him. He showed no irritation, but with an expression of perplexity rather than vexation said, 'Three months lost,' and then resumed his usual manner, asked me about many things in Hungary, told me that when I was at a loss I should have gone to the Hotel Tigris, which was the rendezvous of the patriots, and that there I would have made acquaintance with some of his friends, who would have helped me out. He went on talking of other things as calmly as if I had not disappointed him. I had not the courage to urge my services in any other matter, and he saw that I had not in me the stuff for a conspirator, gays me the money to pay my passage home, and we parted with the understanding that if it came to fighting

THE MASS OF JUPITER.

Buffalo Express.

Indications That Its Surface Matter Is In a Gascous State. Taking the earth's mean distance from

the sun at 92,796,950 miles, as given by Harkness, the mean distance of Jupiter from the sun will be 482,803,970 miles. The eccentricity of its elliptical orbit being 0.04825, its distance from the sun at perihelion is 459,507,760 miles and at aphelion 506, 100, 180 miles. Between its greatest and least distances, therefore, there is a difference of 46, 592, 420 miles, or about one-half the earth's mean distance from the sun. The inclination of Jupiter's orbit to the plane of the ecliptic being only 1 degree 18 minutes 41 seconds-or less than that of any of the other large planets, with the exception of Uranus—the planet never departs much from the ecliptic, and hence it was called by the ancients the "ecliptic planet." Its period of revolution round

the sun is 11 years 314.8 days. The inclination of its axis of rotation being nearly at right angles to the plane of its orbit, there are practically no sea: sons in this distant world, and the only variation in the heat and light at any point on its surface would be that due to the comparatively small variation in its distance from the sun referred to above. Its mean distance from the sun being 5.2028 times the earth's mean distance from the sun, it follows that the heat and light received by Jupiter are 27 times (5,9 squared) less than the earth receives. The amount of heat received from the sun by this planet is very small, and were it constituted like the earth its surface should be perpetually covered by frest and snow. Far from this being the case, the telescope

shows its atmosphere to be in a state of constant and wonderful change. These extraordinary changes cannot possibly be due to the solar heat, and they have suggested the idea that the planet may perhaps be in a redhot state, a miniature sun, in fact, glowing with inherent heat. The great brilliancy of its surface, the "albedo," as it is called, and its small density-less than that of the sun—are facts in favor of this hypothesis. As the attraction of Jupiter's enormous mass would render the materials near its center of much greater density than those near its surface, the latter must be considerably lighter than water and may possibly be in the gaseous state.-Gentleman's

COLOR HEARING. Dr. Colman's Interesting Theory About the

Relation of Spunds to Color. John Locke's blind man, who hazarded the guess that the color scarlet was probably something like the sound of a trumpet, is generally thought to have simply spoken according to his lights, or rather lack of lights, but it appears from Dr. W. S. Colman's articles on this subject that we have now laid the foundation of a science of color hearing. The term is defined by him as applying to the special case in which a color sen sation is excited by some auditory stimulus—as, for example, by the pronunciation of the vowel sounds. It is not a matter of association, as in the case of the "shrill squeak" evoked by the filing of a saw or the drawing of a state pencil down a slate. Dr. Colman estimates the number of people who possess the faculty of color hearing as under 12 per cent and mentions a case described by Flournoy, in which the vowel "i"




