Dr. Thomas W. Spranklin, of Baltimore, the veterinary surgeon, reports the outbreak and prevalence of the disease of horses known as "Farmer's cerebro-spinal meningitis." It is more prevalent during the winter months ordinarily than in warm weather. Dr. Spranklin was called to the farm of Mr. T. Alvah Merritt, on Patapsco Neck, where the disease showed itself several days ago. Mr. Merritt had fourteen head of horses and mules; three of them have died, and the remaining eleven are afflicted with the disease. The latter are improving under treatment.

FATAL DISEASE AMONG HORSES.

Mr. Merrit describes the symptoms shown by the horse first affected, a few days ago, as follows: His gait was very animal ate his breakfast as usual in the morning; during the day he was taken out of the wagon and led to water, but he was unable to swallow; several hours later the horse fell from general paralysis, and was unable to rise. He died a few hours late. The following day a mule was stricken in the same manner, and died. Dr. Spranklin, in describing the condition of all of the animals, says he found them all more or less affected with blood poison, superinduced by a specific microscopic vegetable organism (micro-bacteria), which got into the circulating system of the horses and mules through feeding them at different times with potatoes, while the vegetables were

Coxevites.—Goyenor Brown quietly dropped out of Baltimore on Saturday night, and on Sunday was able to announce that he had transported 100 of

the arrested Coxcyltes to Cincinnati. The Governor went to the House of Correction at 9 o'clock Sa'urday night with an armful of pardons. Superintendent Moore aroused the sleeping Coxeyites, and 100 of them were lined up, dressed, and put on board two passenger cars on the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, which were in waiting at Bridewell Station and which were attached to the Western train leaving Camden Station at 4 o'clock. The task of "sorting out" the men was a tedious one. The Governor made a speech to the pardoned vagrants, in which he expressed his sympathy for them. He said the partions had been issued on condition that they never return to Maryland unless able and willing to support themselves Three cheers were given for Governor Brown, and a colored Coxeyite promised to vote for him if allowed to stay in the State. The Governor made arrange ments for the men to be fed en route to Cincinnati. Wealers are being received daliy at the House of Correction from the counties west of the Chesaneake. Governor Brown estimates that he will have to furnish 200 more of them with transportation. He says he is determined to rid the State of all Coxeyites or organized bodies of vagrants.
