CULTURE OF VANILLA

AN ORCHID CULTIVATED IN MEXICO AND SOUTH AMERICA.

flow the Ground Is Prepared, the Cutting Planted and the Fruit Cured-Methods Vary According to Locality, but the Process In'Any Case Is Very Interesting.

Of all orchids the vanilla is the one most widely known and is remarkable in possessing the only species of the order that has any economic value. There are about 20 species scattered throughout the tropies, that having commercial value being Vanilla planifolia. It is characterized by having a tall climbing and branching leafy stem and large flowers of delicious fragrance, chiefly white and red (in several economic species, green), with a broad, concave stalked lip, at the base rolled about the column, to which the stalk is adnate. The dark brown pods, or fruit, are 6 to 9 inches long and are filled with a dark, oily, odorous pulp. In Mexico vanilla is planted either in a field or in a forest. To render a forest fit for growing a crop all is cleared off but its young saplings, which must serve as supports to the vanilla, the preference being given to trees having a milky sap. Near each tree two cuttings are placed side by side in the following mymer: In a shallow trench 1½ inches deep and 16 inches long three knots of cutting, previously deprived of leaves, are laid and covered up with brush and dead leaves. The remainder of the cutting-2 or 3 feet long-is placed against the tree and tied to it. The supporting trees should be no nearer than 12 or 15 feet apart to give

sufficient room for the development of the plant. After a month the cuttings have taken root and must be carefully kept free from weeds or briers of all kinds. On the third year vanilla thus planted begins to bear fruit (improperly called beans) and continues many years. When, on the other hand, a field on flat land or river bottom is selected, the Mexicans first plow it up thoroughly and on it raise a crop of maize. While this is growing the field becomes. it appears, covered with a quantity of young lactescent trees of the fig family, which, after a year, are large and strong enough to support the vanilla vine. On the island of Reunion the mode of cultivating vanilla is still different. In Mexico, where the fecundation of the flower is left to nature, the plant is allowed to climb up the trees, while in Reunion, where the fecundation is artificially performed, the plant is not allowed to grow out of human reach. Cuttings are set at the foot of trees, the trunks of which are joined together by sticks of bamboo, so as to form a sort of lattice on which the va-nilla can grow and spread freely. In no case are the trees ever cat down, for the plant loves a moist ground and equally fears a burning sun. It is under these large trees that the vanilla plant is seen in its typical form, vigorous and very productive. In the second case the planter must first proceed to grow the supports of his future, plantation. For this purpose the preference is given to the tree producing the physic nut, owing to its easy and rapid growth and its abundant lac tescent juice well adapted to the nutrition of the vanilla plant. When the trees have a size sufficient to afford shade to the plant, the cuttings are set out. The rainy and the hot seasons are chosen for this operation, as the cuttings require

When the young shoots begin to grow up and to send out adventitious and aerial roots, they need only to be directed and o receive them. After two years a vanilla plantation in full bearing is the result. Experience has shown that a vanil! plantation should not be worked for over seven years, but in the meantime a new one is got in readiness so there may be no

frequent watering while they are taking

The fecundated flower dries on the ovary and in a few days falls off, leaving the fruit, which is called the umbilic. The fruit, which contains within its tough pericarp a soft, black pulp, in which many minute seeds are in bedded, continues growing until the end of the first month, but it must be left on the stem six months longer to rigen chough. The vanilla harvest ir. Mizico takes place in December. Each bean-or, better called, fruit-must be gathered separately and not the whole cluster. If too ripe, the pods are apt to split during the curing, while if not ripe they lack fragrancy and proper color. The ripe fruit has of itself no edor-it is; special fermentation which develops the deasant fragrancy of the vanilla. When he fruit is left to ripen on the plant, i splits in two unequal parts and become rst yellow, then brown and finally black //hile it is drying an unctuous liquid of a dark red color, called balsam of vanilla, exudes, and when quite dry the pod is orittle and almost devoid of all odor. Various are the processes known for puring—there is the Guiana, Peruvian,

Mexican and Reunion. The Mexican process is as follows: As soon as gathered the beans are placed in heaps under a shed to protect them from both rain and sun thine, and a few days later are submitted to a sweating porcess. This is carried out in two different ways, according to the state of the weather. If it happens to be warm and clear, the beans are early in the morning spread on a woolen blanket and exposed to the direct rays of the sun. About 12 m. or 1 p. m. the blanket is folded around the beans, and the bundle is left in the sun for the remainder of the day. In the evening all the pods are inclosed in tight boxes, so that they may sweat the whole night. The next day the beans are ngain exposed to the sun. They thus acquire a dark coffee color, the shade being

deeper brown in proportion to the suc ress of the sweating operation. Should the weather be cloudy the vanilla is made into bundles and a number of these packed logether into a small bale, which is first wrapped with woolen cloth, then with banana leaves over it, and finally with a tout matting, which is bound firmly and prinkled with water. An oven is now heated to 140 degrees

F., and the bales containing the larger leans are placed in it. When the temperture has been decreased to 113 degrees F., the smaller beans are introduced, and the oven is closed tightly. After 24 hours the smaller beans are taken from the oven and 12 hours later the larger ones. Dur-ing the process the vanilla has sweated Ind acquired a fine maroon color.

Now the drying, a most delicate operation, must be attended to with great care. The beans are spread on matting and exposed to the sun during nearly two months. When the drying is nearly complete, it is finished in the shade in a very

TELEGRAPHY UNDER DIFFICULTIES. Little Mont tony In the Life of an Operator

In Persla. Lieutenant Colonel Wells gives a lively sketch of the little experiences which break, sometimes a trifle too roughly, the monotony of the life of telegrapher in a Persian city. In Shiraz an old palace does duty as a telegraph office, one end being occupied by the British and the other by the Persian administration. A square in front of the palace is a favorite site for political and other disturbances, and in times of popular excitement the first point to which the crowds gravitate is the Persian telegraph office. The popular leader demands that a petition embodying the wrongs of the citizens shall be dispatched to the shah. If the reply is not quickly forthcoming, the mob usually clears out the officials and smashes up all the in-

struments. A move is then made for the British office, and a message is dictated to the superintendent, who has to forward it to the dictator in Teheran. This functionary hands e-pies of it to her Britannie majesty's minister, the grand vizier and the Persian minister of telegraph and consults them with a view to obtaining protection for his staff. The position in which the senior British telegraph official at the sending station is placed in the meantime is that of a hestage in the hands of the mob In a very serious riot which occurred the superintendent at Shiraz was so detained and was not allowed to leave the office precincts for five days. The local governor was powerless to afford protection, as his troops, seeing the chance of a few days' relaxation, with a dash of mild excitement thrown in, had promptly fraternized with the insurgents at the begin ning of the outbreak. The tact of the superintendent served him in good stead during this trying ordeal, through which not a moment's delay occurred to the in ternational messages, and not the slightest damage was done to the office. A few years ago a less fortunate outcome of such a difficulty could have been expect ed. The civilizing effect of the Indo-European telegraph is remarkable. - St. Louis Globe-Democrat.

SOME SECRET INKS.

Letters That Appear Invisible U2til They Are Exposed to Heat. Letters written with a solution of gold silver, copper, tin or mercury dissolved in aqua fortis, or, simpler still, of iron or lead in vinegar, with water added until the liquor dees not stain a white paper, will remain invisible for two or thre months if kept shut up in the dark, but on exposure for some hours to the open air will gradually acquire color or will do so instantly on being held before the fire. Each of these solutions gives its own peculiar color to the writing—gold, a deep violet; silver, slate; lead and copper, brown, but all possess this common disadvantage-that in time they eat away the paper, leaving the letters in the form of perforations. There are a vast number of other solutions that become visible on exposure to heat or on having a heated iron passed over them, the explanation being that the matter is readily burned to a sort of charcoal, simplest among which we may mention lemon juice or milk, but the one that produces the best result is made by dissolving a scruple of sal ammoniae in two ounces of water.

Writing with rice water, to be rendered visible by the application of iodine, was practiced successfully in the correspondence with Jelalabad in the first Afghan war. The letter was concealed in a quill. On opening it a small paper was unfolded, on which appeared the single word "Todine." The magic liquid was applied, ed, on which appeared the single word and therewith appeared an important dis patch from Sir Robert Eale.—Chambers

A redical railroad engineer says: "I often hear people enlarge upon the difficulties of driving a locomotive in the dark or during a heavy rain; but, for my part, nothing ever gave me more anxiety than con tinuous sunshine. Color blindness is frequently nothing more than intense pain in the eyes caused by watching objects which reflect the light and upon which the sun is shining. In a run of several hours, the glare from the rails which strikes the eyes while watching for track obstructions, and more particularly for rails which have been forced out of line by the heat, is very trying, and often when I have left the locomotive after such a run I have found the greatest comfort in resting in a room where Egyptian darkness prevailed. A man is afraid to wear smoked glasses lest he should be suspected of color blindness and lose his position. But some protection of this kind would greatly prolong the career of many an engineer and fireman."—St. Louis Globe-Democrat.

Large Salary of the French President. As presidential salaries go, the pay of the French president is liberal. He receives 1,200,000 francs, or £48,000 per annum. The salary of the president of the United States is \$50,000 (£10,000), while the vice president gets \$8,090 (£1,600). The president of the Swiss confederation has to be content with a very modest sum, his services being valued at only £600 per annum. The presidents of the South American republics are paid on a more liberal scale, the president of Chile, for instance, getting about £3,000. But it is not every one who would care to rule the destinies of a South American republic at that figure. - Westminster Gazette.






