THE POWER OF SUBSIDY. The elections which thus far have been held in the several states show that the Republicans are moving heaven and earth to regain lost prestige. Every specious argument that the mind of man could devise has been used and unremitting diligence has been exercised to get out their vote to the man. They have called into use their best talent (notably in Maine) to harangue the people and to excite the workingmen with fear. Maine gave a large Republican majority, but it is a lumber state and now lumber is admitted free. It was no argument up in Maine to say, that while you were benefited a few dollars per thousand feet on your lumber by the McKinley tariff law, there were millions of farmers and poor men paying just that much tribute to you, for your enrichment. They wouldn't look at it in that light. They were in favor of the McKinley law because it protected them, no matter what it may have cost the vast majority. In other words Maine was a subsidized state, bought as it were, by the Republican party, while the people were compelled to foot the bill.

No nation buys or ever will buy our "protected," double priced, shoddy clothing and tinselled wares. A war-embargo on American goods could scarcely shut them out from foreign marts more effectually than the "protective" tariff has done.



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
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
