The women from the counter move toward the door. The little girl is not far behind. If you had looked closelysomething you would have never thought of doing-you might have seen a sharp, keen eyed young man eying the girl closely. If you had been an attentive observer, you might have seen this innocent, blue eyed little girl nod sharply at the two women as they pass out, then turn on her heel and go back among the crowd. Then you would have noticed that the sharp eyed young man quietly left the store with the two women. He is fashionably dressed, idly wears a cane and has doubtless been making some purchases himself. Half a block away he taps one of the women on the shoulder.




