The Seven Bibles of the World. Scriptures of the Christian. The Koran the Old and New Testaments, and from the Talmud. The Tri Hitikes contain sublime morals and pure aspirations. Their author lived and died in the sixth century before Christ. The sacred writings of the Chinese are called the Five Kings, the word "kings" meaning web of cloth. From this it is presumed they were originally written on five rolls of cloth. They contain wise sayings on the duties of life, but they cannot be traced further back than the eleventh century before our era. The Vedas are the most ancient books in the language of the Hindus, but they do not, accord ing to late commentators, antedate the twelth century before the Christian era. The Zendavesta of the Persians, next to our Bible, is reckoned among scholars as being the greatest and most learned of the sacred writings. Zoroaster, whose sayings it contains, lived and worked in the twelfth century before Christ. Moses lived and wrote the

was given to the world in the fourteenth century. Webster's Reply to Hayne. Daniel Webster's celebrated reply to Hayne was preserved from oblivion by the wife of Joseph Gales, who for many years was one of the official reporters of the United States Senate. Webster said he intended to speak only half an hour, but when on the way to the Senate he met Judge Story, who told him it was a good opportunity to give his views upon the Constitution. Instead of speaking half an hour, Webster spoke half a day, but Mr. Gales wrote on, unconscious of the lapse of time under the enchantment of the great orator. When he came to look over his notes, however, he was appalled at the labor involved in their transcription, and, being a very busy man, he told Mr. Webster he did not know when, if ever, he would be able to write out his speech, for in those days a mere abstract was made of the proceedings of Congress. In vain the orator used remonstrance, for the over-taxed journalist remained firm. Then Mrs. Gales came to the rescue, having been in the habit of assisting her husband in writing out his notes. She undertook the task, and in less than a week Mr. Gales handed to Mr. Webster a full report of his speech in Mrs. Gales' handwriting. Not five words were changed in the speech, and soon a thousanddollar diamond necklace accompanied the rich thanks of the eloquent states-

> Weight of Various Metals. Cast iron weighs 444 pounds to the cubic foot, and a one-inch square bar will sustain a weight of 16,500 pounds; bronze, weight 525, tenacity 36,000; wrought fron, weight 480, tenacity 50,-000; hard "struck" steel, weight 490, tenacity 78,000; alumnium, weight 168. tenacity 26,000. We are accustomed to think of metals as being stronger than wood, and so they are, generally speak ing, if only pieces of the same size be tested. When equal weights of these two materials are compared it is then found that several varieties of wood are stronger than ordinary steel. A bar of pine just as heavy as a bar of steel an inch square will hold up 125,000 pounds, the best ash 175,000 pounds, and some hemlock 200,000 pounds. Wood is bulky. It occupies ten or twelve times the space of steel. The best castings made for the United States navy have a tenacity of 65,000 to 75,000 pounds to the square inch. By solidifying such castings under great pressure a tensile strength of 80, 000 to 150,000 pounds may be obtained. -Railway Review.


