



AN OUTRAGE AT ELKRIDGE.

Young Man Gets His Throat Gashed by Negro Highwayman. The Baltimore News of Monday states that William Fazard, aged 25 years, of Elizabethport, N. J., was lying at the Maryland University Hospital with three deep gashes in his throat and neck, inflicted by a negro highway robber at about 4.30 o'clock Monday morning near

Mr. Fazard had a narrow escape with his life after a desperate struggle with his antagonist. He is a machinist, and, being out of work, he was coming to

He said he was walking from Washington to Baltimore and as he was coming along the railroad track Monday morning within a mile of Elkridge a burly negro sprung from a clump of bushes and made a furious lunge at him. He had an open knife and knocked Fazard down and demanded money, cutting his necessary scenes connected with His throat all the time with his knife, which, fortunately, was a dull one.

Fazard made a struggle for his life and also cried out at the top of his voice. He had no money with which to satisfy his assailant, and finally after a nard fight, succeeded in regaining his feet. 

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
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
