The Nicaragua Canal bill passed the United States Senate on Friday by a vote of 31 to 21. The bill as passed provides for the guarantee of \$70,000,000 worth of 3 per cent, bonds, secured by a first payable annually by the company, and failure carries with it the right of foreclosure and sale. 
