What Started the Run.

If, as Mr. Reed and some of his supporters contend, the drain upon the gold in the Treasury was caused by the Wilson tariff, we should like to have them explain why it began in 1891, the year the McKinley tariff went into operation, and continued at an accelerating rate in the following year, the last of the Harrison administration.

The payments of gold from the Treasury in redemption of United States notes during 1891 were greater than they had been in any year since the first after 1891. They doubled in 1893 and again in 1894. In neither case was the tariff a considerable factor. The demand for gold was started by the Sherman act of 1890, which provided for the issue Treasury notes in exchange for silver

In addition the obligations of the United States was recognized as leading inevitably to the substitution of silver for gold as the basis of the national currency. It discredited at once all the currency then outstanding, and started a run upon the gold in the Treasury which the repeal of the Sherman act, three years later, was too late to stop.
