Remarkable Armor Test. An interesting test of the armor plates for the turrets of the battle ships Massachusetts and Indiana has been made recently at the proving ground of the Bethel steel 15 inches thick, and represented nearly 500 tons of armor. The tests were made with a 10 inch gun, and consisted in firing two shots at the armor from a distance of 250 feet. One shot was to try to crack the plate and the other to pierce it. The curved armor plate was set up on edge and bolted to an oak backing 3 feet thick. 


