WHERE PROSPERITY BEGINS. If prosperity is to start from bed rock that time is near at hand. The terrible drop of every species of property in the past few years has had a most paralyzing effect on business. But there is a normal basis and the shrinkage will go on until that basis is reached. When real estate and other property get to the lowest possible notch there will be a demand for it. Wheat is king for the reason that when it is a good price business generally is good. It seems a rule amounting almost to a law that a low price for wheat brings down everything else commensurately. When wheat was two dollars a bushel laborers in the harvest field could easily command two dollars per day; when it was one dollar seldom more than that was paid per day at least in the palmy days of the cradler and the two followers who took up and bound the grain. From this it can easily be seen that five-sixths of the business troubles in this country have arisen from the deficient price of a cereal which directly affects ten million homes and indirectly as many more.

The aggregate effect of this is neces sarily paralyzing to every kind of effort and the general rule among the people is a struggle merely for existence as far as conducting a business and keeping out of debt is concerned.


As we have said there is a normal basis somewhere, which, when reached, growth should be the result. Already, we be lieve, farmers have begun to adapt themselves to the situation and in the end will make farming pay in some way. A dollar goes a great way nowadays, and by the exercise of a little self-denial on the part of a young farmer out of debt he stands as good a chance to get along as did his forefathers who became weilto-do and respectable members of society though they did wear home spun clothes and ate mush and milk before the blaz

ing logs of the great fire place. We are in a state of transition, passing from the primitive and poetic days of the past to new and startling conditions, not knowing hardly "where we are at," or what we ought to do or can do next. We need crystallization, an adaptation of ourselves to the new order of things. Land is at a discount. Estates were once the evidence of wealth. It is not so now, an anamolous condition indeed, but who knows that all this in the whirl of the rapid changes going on will not take a sudden

and favorable turn? At present there is hardly a great enterprise in the country entrenched enough even with abundance of capital to enjoy immunity from new inventions and scientific discovery. A company spends millions to put down a cable line only to be supplanted by the more facile electric motor. An expensive gas plant has been rendered almost inoperative by a new illuminant. All of the historic flouring mills of the past are now only so much wreckage. The skilled mechanic of the country is now only a repairer or a cobbler, and so the list goes on ever increasing.

All laws and statesmanship, looking to an equalization of opportunities among men for the time being will fail-With all this the world can thank God there is plenty to eat though business is paralyzed even amidst that plenty.


