A New Farmers' Club. The farmers living between Dorsey's Station and Elkridge Landing in Howard county, alongside of the Baltimore and Ohio R. R. met Thursday night 14th inst., at the residence of Mr. John Kynes and organized the Elkridge Farmers' Club, electing Mr. Ambrey Hopkins president and Mr. N. A. Pfeiffer secretary. Quite a discussion was carried on as to the value of Farmers' Clubs, and it was generally conceded that it was only by the farmers joining together and whole neighborhoods working in unison that they could be remedied and advanced. Resolutions were passed recommending State aid for the holding of farmers' institutes, requesting the B. & O. R. R. to offer better transportation of trucking crops to the Baltimore and Washington markets, and a special committee was appointed composed of Ambrey Hopkins, Henry Pfeiffer and John Kynes to wait on the express company to secure a lower rate of freight on berries to Western markets. The next meeting will be held at Mr. Frank Carter's near Dorsey's Station, and the purpose of the section are expected to be present.
